**CAROL F. SHULER**  
President

Carol F. Shuler, L.A. is President of C.F. Shuler, Inc., a firm that specializes in, but is not limited to, arid region landscape architecture. She received her degree from the University of Arizona, studying landscape architecture, architecture and horticulture. Numerous awards have been received for her innovative and environmentally sensitive designs.

Since 1970, Shuler has provided consulting services throughout Arizona, Southern California, and Nevada to a variety of clients. Her services include: field investigation; master planning; design concepts; budgeting; construction documents including construction details and specifications; irrigation engineering; water use studies; site observations; consultant management; recommendation of contractors; construction management; graphics; and development of design guidelines.

Her understanding of the fragility of the desert environment propels her work with arid and native plants and desert fauna. Environmentally oriented work has included large-scale developments and highway corridor studies. Visual and biological assessments have been conducted in a variety of sensitive habitats requiring knowledge of the interrelationship of flora and fauna. Habitats have been restored as parts of environmental mitigation for a wide range of plant communities, including desert and riparian. Shuler has directed the inventory and assessment of over 27,000 plants for salvage potential.

Shuler's knowledge of natural habitat combined with her experience in horticulture and irrigation requirements aids in the development of designs which are sensitive to the environment, durable and easy to maintain. Since 1981, she has won numerous awards recognizing her design excellence. In 1992, she was one of the initial eight recipients of the CARE award that honored projects nationwide demonstrating outstanding water conservation.

Her designs appeared in Ken Druse's book Native Habitat Garden and she is frequently featured in Sunset Magazine, Phoenix Home and Garden and industry-specific journals. Her book, Low Water Use Plants for California and the Southwest is slated to become the primary reference for Landscape Architects and amateur gardeners. She has also recently completed a chapter in The Brooklyn Botanical Gardens' book Going Native.

Shuler recognizes the benefits a public participation plan can add to a project. Her presentations at public meetings include graphics and easily understood concepts that alleviate public concerns and smooth project acceptance. This includes the Papago Freeway, Squaw Peak Highway and Indian School Road widenings where public art was integrated into the engineering design. Using the artist as a team member, public input ultimately provided the design theme. Extremely sensitive environmental issues such as riparian habitat, endangered species and archeological sites on native American lands were issues on Andreas Cove Country Club, Palm Springs, CA and San Xavier Planned Community, Tucson, AZ.

Sample projects include:

**Public Works:** City of Phoenix projects include: *New City Hall*, including parking garage and 2nd Avenue pedestrian mall; *Civic Plaza Renovation*; multi-use *Detention Basin 3 A & B Park*; regional parks; pool facilities, landfills, water treatment plants; wastewater treatment plants, and field investigations for inventory and assessment of existing vegetation for salvage on all of the large scale projects plus *Cave Creek Road* and the *Squaw Peak Highway*.

**Streets, Roads, and Highways:** Landscape concept and master plan for Arizona Department of Transportation on the *Papago Freeway and East Papago* which includes natural habitats for birds and other wildlife along Rio Salado and for the *Squaw Peak Highway* which bisects the sensitive Phoenix Mountain Preserve; *Design Guidelines* for the above projects plus 25 miles of *Bell Road* improvements for Maricopa County; numerous Scottsdale streets including the *East Couplet*; *Cave Creek Road* in Phoenix and the *Squaw Peak Parkway Phase III*.

**Transit projects:** *Paradise Valley Transit Center*, *South Division* maintenance and training facility; and *Transit Passenger Facility Design Guideline* and *Dreamy Draw Park and Ride*.

**Large Scale Land Investigations and Designs:** *Desert Greenbelt*, Scottsdale; *Tatum Ranch*, Phoenix; *Troon Golf Course and Country Club*, Scottsdale; *Andreas Cove Country Club*, Palm Springs, CA; *Monte Vista RV Resort Park*; *Pueblo El Mirage RV Resort Park*; Falcon Lake properties, Cathedral City, CA; *Wickenburg Inn Tennis and Guest Ranch*.

**Golf Courses:** Shuler has designed landscape for the following golf course architects: *A. Jack Snyder*; *Forest Richardson*; *Gerald Perki*; *Tom Clark*; *Greg Nash*; *Jay Moorish*; *Jack Nicklaus*; *Tom Weiskopf* and *Arnold Palmer*.

Courses include: *Troon*, named one of the best in the nation; *The Scottsdale TPC Desert and Stadium Courses* rehabilitation; *Emerald River* in Laughlin, Nevada; as well as the *Stonecreek* rehabilitation with Arthur Hills.

**Water Use Studies:** Include a major water users study completed for the *Department of Water Resources* which is the basis for DWR, second Management Plan and the 20,000 acre *San Xavier Master Planned Community* south of Tucson.
