

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**SUMMARY OF SUN HEALTH'S WITNESS WILLIAM SELLNER
THROUGH REBUTTAL TESTIMONY IN THE RATE CASES
FILED BY ARIZONA-AMERICAN WATER COMPANY, INC.
DOCKET NO. WS-01303A-02-0867 ET AL.**

RATE DESIGN

- Sun Health's testimony is focused on Staff's proposed rate design.
- Staff is proposing a three-tiered inverted rate structure with break over points at 4,000 and 100,000 gallons for the purpose of promoting efficient water use, a conservation rate.
- Sun Health supports the goal of water conservation but is concerned that staff's proposal will not result in reduction of water usage. Sun Health asserts the rate design by staff fails to account for differences in reasonable usage across customer classes. A reasonable consumption requirement for a residential user is not the same as an industrial user. Because staff's proposal fails to account for these differences, the break overpoints are set far too low for industrial customers usage requirements. As a result, industrial users will not make an effort to reduce consumption below those break points because often it will be impossible to do so. For example, Sun Health's hospital facilities utilize an average of just over 6,000,000 gallons of water per month. It would be impossible for Sun Health to reduce its water consumption below 100,000 gallons per month and still provide service.
- Sun Health also expressed its concern that the rate design would result in the hospital subsidizing the rates of other water users. Based on rebuttal testimony provided by American Water Company's witness, Mr. Kozoman, it appears that staff's proposal will shift a large portion of the revenue requirements to customers using over 100,000 gallons monthly.
- Sun Health states that it is seeking to establish separate break over points for hospitals and similar facilities to provide reasonable and attainable goals for reduction in consumption.
- Sun Health then described a number of measures it currently takes to reduce its water consumption including timers on sprinklers and drip plan irrigation systems, monitoring its run-off from landscaping use of water minimizer plumbing fixtures, automatic blow down systems on boilers closed loop water cooling on water seal pumps to eliminate water flow to drains.
- Sun Health also described its facilities that would be impacted by this rate case. Those facilities include the Walter O. Boswell Memorial Hospital with 343 beds, the Del E. Webb Memorial Hospital with 269 beds, the Sun Health Care Center, Sun Health Home Care Services, Sun Health Alzheimer's Residence, the Sun Health Hospice Care Services and the Sun Health Residence for Special Adults.

- Sun Health also described the number of people it serves in a community. In 2002, Sun Health treated almost 30,000 in patients and more than 62,000 emergency department patients, as well as providing 190,000 out patient procedures.
- Sun Health also described its financial structure as a non-profit tax exempt entity that supports its activities primarily based on contributions as well as investment revenue generated by Sun Health Properties, Inc.
