Mohave Sun representative requested that I inform you of the progress of our mutual efforts to bring Renewable Energy projects forward. The Hualapai Tribe has worked for 7 years to develop its Renewable Energy Program while working with W.A.P.A.-D.O.E.-B.I.A. This includes engineering studies of potential sites and collection of wind energy data. Like a lot of Az. Tribes we have struggled to be prepared for the unique opportunity to be a commercial energy provider and we continue to update our feasibility work.

When Mohave Sun came to town we were eager to strike up a relationship with them and they responded warmly to the Tribe and their leadership. The Hualapai Tribes energy projects and a chance to have hard line transmission to its primary economic tourism site at Grand Canyon West has always seemed impossible till now. The substation proposed by Mohave Valley Solar where they would be the anchor energy tenant is in a perfect location for the Hualapai Tribe to access connection to the grid and achieve transmission distribution for its tourism site and export renewable Energy Project. While this apparent Manna from Heaven appears tenuous, Mohave Sun continues to assist us. They have assisted us in acquiring a B.I.A. Grant where they were listed as a financial partner to contribute specific tasks in bringing a comprehensive feasibility study to completion. The significant accomplishments are completing the business plan and establishing a P.P.A. They signed a M.O.U. with the Tribe in early August that was a commitment for these tasks. They have also promised to develop local training for Tribal members in the new solar energy field. The strategies involved in these efforts and the other tasks involved in making Az. Tribes successful require partnerships and we are sincerely appreciative of Hualapai Valley Solar's commitment to us. I appreciate your allowing me to share this information with you.

New Health Department Project Update

The Hualapai Tribe Health Department facility can now be seen coming out of the ground in front of the old I.H.S. Clinic, on the corner of Hualapai Way and Diamond Creek Road.

The new 10,000 square foot facility will be offering the same health services that it has always provided under the direction of Director, Sandra Irwin. The project was tribal council approved three (3) years ago and is funded by the tribe in conjunction with two Indian Community Development Block Grants from H.U.D. for a total cost of \$1,724,700.

The building committee and tribal council approved an Energy Efficient – healthy building design that included A.A.C. block for exterior walls, R-24-30 insulation, maximum day lighting with skylight solar tubes throughout, all LED lighting which is five times more efficient than the squiggly compact florescent bulbs, high efficient air conditioning with energy flywheel, 22 S.E.E.R. and spray foam insulation on the ceiling, R50, that gives a energy efficient tight envelope for reduced energy bills.

The committee wanted more solar and green features but tight budgets allow for only the most cost effective green features to be incorporated into the building. The building is also a healthy building that has no V.O.C. –volatile organic compounds – toxic chemicals, in the paints, flooring or other components like the cabinets.

The next current approved and funded community project under way is a day care facility to be located by the Head Start. The architect has been selected and construction drawings are being developed.

An application is also being prepared with a feasibility study for the next project, which is an elderly assisted living center. This project is designed with 10 bedrooms to serve elders' with all the assisted facilities they need.


