

Navajos, Hopis explore single district

PHOENIX — As the Hopi Tribe signaled a new willingness to share representation in Washington, the Navajo Nation proposed Thursday that Arizona's new congressional districts include one with enough American Indians to elect one of their own to Congress.

The Navajo and Hopi tribes have had cool and even bitter relations, but Hopi Chairman LeRoy Shingóitewa said it makes sense for the groups to be in the same district to have more collective clout on issues of common concern.

"The concept is what is good for tribes, not just one tribe," Shingóitewa said.

Leonard Cornian, executive director of the Navajo Nation's human-rights commission, presented the state's redistricting commission with several proposals that would dramatically redraw the landscape of much of rural Arizona.

Both of the Navajos' congressional proposals would create a rural-dominated district covering Eastern Arizona, taking in the Navajo, Hopi, Havasupai, Hualapai, White Mountain Apache and San Carlos Apache

reservations.

Both versions would reach southward to Cochise County on the Mexican border, with one extending westward to include the Tohono O'odham Nation in Southern Arizona and the other going through Pinal County to include the Gila River Indian Community.

A separate proposal by the Navajos would redraw the current legislative district that now includes the reservation to include less of Flagstaff and more of Apache and Navajo counties south of the reservation.

The Navajo Reservation is now part of Arizona's 1st

Congressional District, which includes Prescott and Flagstaff and most of eastern and northeastern Arizona — but not the Hopi Reservation, though it is surrounded by the much larger Navajo Reservation.

The last redistricting commission had District 2 extend inside District 1 to place the Navajo and Hopi lands in separate districts.

But the tribes' relations have improved, and Shingóitewa said he expects the Hopi Tribal Council soon will consider a resolution on forging a common front with the Navajos on redistricting.

Arizona Corporation Commission Public Hearing Information
No hearing has been set on the application. The Commission will consider the application and Staff's recommendation at an Open Meeting of the Commission that will be held following the issuance of a Staff Report. At that Open Meeting, the Commission may vote on the application or may determine that an evidentiary hearing

should be held for the purpose of taking evidence on limited issues. Should the Commission decide to hold a hearing, the process will be expedited and the schedule will be tailored to allow the Commission to reach a determination on the application by the end of December, 2011. **Unless you intervene in this docket, you will receive no further notice of any Open Meetings or any hearing that may be held on the application.**

Following the issuance of the Staff Report, intervenors will have 10 days to file comments thereon and/or to request that a hearing be held. Any request for hearing must state with specificity the issue or issues which the intervenor believes necessitate an evidentiary hearing. In its discretion, the Commission may or may not hold a hearing.

About Intervention
Under appropriate circumstances, interested parties may intervene in this case. Any person or entity entitled by law to intervene and having a direct and substantial interest in the matter will be permitted to intervene.

If you wish to intervene, you must file an original and 13 copies of a written motion to intervene with the Commission no later than **September 30, 2011**, and send a copy of the motion to TEP or its counsel and to all parties of record. Your motion to intervene must contain the following:

1. Your name, address, and telephone number, and the name, address, and telephone number of any party upon whom service of documents is to be made, if not yourself;
2. A short statement of your interest in the proceeding (e.g., a customer of TEP, a shareholder of TEP, etc.); and
3. A statement certifying that you have mailed a copy of the motion to intervene to TEP or its counsel and to all parties of record in the case.

The granting of motions to intervene shall be governed by A.A.C. R14-3-105, except that all motions to intervene must be filed on or before **September 30, 2011**. All parties must comply with Arizona Supreme Court Rules 31 and 38 and A.R.S. § 40-243 with respect to the practice of law. Failure to intervene will not preclude any interested person or entity from providing public comment on the application or from filing written comments in the record of the case.
