The current rate that APS customers pay for On-Peak power is 19.8 cents in winter and 24.5 cents in summer (using the Time Advantage rates). So I'm getting paid three to four times LESS than this market rate!

The 60 Plus Association and others (including APS) spreading misleading falsehoods about net metering are adding in the cost of APS incentives paid out from the beginning of the program to help solar get started. Those incentives are all but gone now. They also add in the cost of building and maintaining the network of wires we're all connected to. APS claims that rooftop customers don't pay for this infrastructure. My bill, with its "Delivery Service Charge" proves otherwise. As a rooftop solar owner I don't object to a small fee per month to help APS build the network but up to \$100 per month as APS is proposing? Now that's ridiculous.
