Dear Commissioner:

I agree that net-metering is bad for consumers and that solar leasing companies are an inefficient and expensive way to deploy distributed solar generation.

Therefore, I urge you to redesign the present net-metering program, where consumers are compensated at retail rates, and create a system of renewable energy feed-in tariffs where consumers become "prosumers" and they are paid a fair price, based on the cost of the energy generated--and that ensures a reasonable rate of return on their solar investment--to feed *their* energy into the electric grid for a contract period of 20 years.

Of course, such a program would require that the present net-meter be relocated in front of the consumer's meter thus making the energy fed into the electric grid wholesale energy, rather than retail energy.

A feed-in tariff program would also necessitate that the utilities ensure timely interconnection for new systems and that they "must take" the energy from the new feed-in tariff contracts first so as to offset more expensive wholesale sources of energy such as power from peaking plants. Those savings, of course, should then be passed on to all consumers.

Finally, the cost of the feed-in tariff program will be distributed across all consumers except for those who can either prove they qualify for energy assistance or are on energy assistance programs.
