Arizona Corporate Commissioners,

I am writing you today to discuss the proposed changes APS has made to Arizona's net metering rules. I cannot stress enough how opposed I am to the proposed changes. Net metering is a very important structure for customers.

- It allows customers to choose to get electricity from the sun or from the utility and allows distributed generation to contribute to the grid itself.

- It also allows customers to control their electricity costs by producing their own energy. While there is a large up-front cost for a solar system, it protects the customer from future rate increases.

- Net metering also provides Arizona jobs. Net metering means more solar electric systems, allowing small solar companies to thrive.

- It is also a driving factor for promoting clean, renewable energy for Arizona.

We are facing a crisis of mammoth proportions in climate change as we continue to emit immense quantities of carbon dioxide, primarily from electricity production from carbon intensive fossil fuels, such as coal. Changing the net metering rules would decimate the incentive to pay the upfront cost and install solar panels. This is a bad idea for all the reasons I listed above, but it is particularly bad for Arizona, given the immense solar resources. The sun provides more energy than humans could ever consume, harnessing it is a logical way to produce energy and the obvious choice for clean, renewable energy in Arizona.

I urge you to look out for the customers rather than the utilities. Distributed generation does diminish a utility's bottom line, but to the benefit of the customers and the benefit to society. It is time to serve the many rather than the wealthy, powerful few, in this case APS and any other utility that supports these changes. I fear these changes will cascade through the state and stymie the growth of solar energy in a state with vast solar resources.

I recently installed a large system on my home to the tune of nearly \$40,000. Federal tax credits make it a more manageable cost, but it is net metering, and lower energy bills, that make it possible for me to do this by giving me a return on my investment. Changing net metering as APS is suggesting would make that payback much, much longer, effectively destroying the incentive and drastically reducing the number of consumers that will install solar panels. This will have a negative impact on customers' pocketbooks, the environment, and solar installation companies by reducing jobs. The only entity that stands to benefit is APS and its shareholders. Again, I urge you to choose the many over the few; the long-term over the short term; the health of the environment a utility's profit. Say "no" to the proposed net metering changes from APS.

Dear Commissioners,

I have been an APS solar customer since 2009. I believe that since I've had the fortune of living in this great state of Arizona, that I should leverage the sun to reduce my carbon footprint. I've lived in two homes with solar (had to move due to a parent moving in with me) and therefore, purchased solar on two homes. I'm just an average Arizonan with average pay yet felt it was important to buy my system and help the environment.

As I understand, APS has a proposal to increase the cost for solar users. APS has the argument that solar costs nonusers. Interesting argument if only I believed it.

I recently came across this article discussing the effects of solar in Germany. This is the article: <u>http://foreignpolicyblogs.com/2012/04/14/100-renewables-for-germany-2050/</u> but let me highlight two things:

1) Germany's goal is 100% renewable energy by 2050.

2) Solar PV penetration into the German electric markets is already lowering the price for wholesale electric power at the hours of peak demand by 40% from only very recently.

If Germany can experience a lower price of peak electricity, I would think APS can also.

Additionally, unrelated to the above, I'd also like to add that if APS is allowed to increase the cost for solar users, the resale value for those of us who have purchased our systems would be negated. On my most recent home, I spent \$15,000 out of pocket for the system and would have seen about half of that back in the resale value of my house. If APS

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wins, I'll lose on resale, benefit to my pocketbook and to the environment as solar usage will take a huge step back in Arizona.

Dear Ms. Ford,

I want to thank you for emailing me the current APS proposal on Renewable Energy. I have read it over cover to cover and thought considerably about what is being proposed.

I am not a lawyer and won't claim to be one although I have many years working with contracts and some graduate courses in Contract Law. That being said here is may take on the APS proposal.

1. Overall, I find it very wordy, and it appears to say one thing but proposes another. APS says that they are losing money, however, if one goes online and looks at Pinnacle West Capital Corporation, the parent company of APS; it is easy to see that they are doing extremely well even during the current economic time. Their **net earnings** for the second quarter rose from \$122.3 Million in 2012 to \$131.2 million in 2013. (Copy of a portion of the Pinnacle West News release included) I think that is very good for a blue chip state regulated company. I am not a fan of itemizing a lot of individual costs on an invoice or aps bill because it is the responsibility of the company to manage their business efficiently, but by separating each element they have shifted that responsibility to the regulatory commission. Unfortunately, we all realize that the Corporation Commission has no control over how a company is managed therefore there is no incentive for a company to improve their efficiency. In fact this system provides an avenue for the company to go to the commission and request for more money to cover any and all company management decisions that fell short of the objective. I believe that this approach circumvents achieving the "Best Practices of Efficient Management". You see this itemization done primarily in cities and utilities where it is possible to just ask for a rate or a tax hike and does nothing to require efficient fiscal responsibility.

2. Since APS and the Corporation Commission clearly see that the Renewable Tariff, enacted last summer, is not fair or equitable to all customers which many overpaid a considerable amount. This proposal should be **retroactive** and credits given to all customers that overpaid the environmental benefits surcharge for the last 12 months.

When the customers considers solar for their facilities they were informed that the life expectancy of the system is about 40 years, at least I was. However, it should be anticipated that the efficiency of the collectors would decrease approximately ½ % per year after 20 years. Hence even at 40 years it would be reasonable to expect that the system would be able to produce 90% of the original capabilities. Therefore, I think, at minimum, APS should grandfather all solar systems installed prior to this modification for a minimum of 40 years vs. the 20 years they propose.
 To be fair to everyone, they should also consider all solar expansions on an existing grandfathered solar system as a new system and base any tariffs on **only** the expansion size and not on the collective total system capacity.

5. Speaking of grandfather clauses, I believe that it is the responsibility of APS to promptly notify all customers that have started the APS paperwork for a solar installation of any changes impacting the operational cost of electricity for their project. This would prevent the customer from being blindsided as I was, and provide an option to cancel the project. If they were not informed by APS, then they should be grandfathered in accordingly. Likewise APS should notify all APS approved contractors and require them to also review these changes with the customer and evaluate financial impact.

6. APS chose to provide financial incentives for businesses or residential customers to install solar. They also required the customers sign an APS developed Grid Tie Agreement which permitted APS to receive renewable credit in meeting the Arizona mandated renewable energy goals. It would be prudent to believe that it was in the best interest, both financially and operationally, for APS to offer these incentives. Additionally APS offered net metering. I am sure that many considered all incentives in arriving at the decision to install solar. I know I did.

7. I realize that APS claims that they are losing money. However, are they actually losing money, or just not making as much as they would like? The **net** quarterly revenues indicate good profit growth. If one extrapolates the 6% per quarter growth over a year that would equate to a 24% growth in annual returns. Solar electricity is only generated during the day light hours when peak electric demand is the greatest. It is generated basically near the point of consumption thereby freeing up transmission line capacity for APS to handle some unforeseen peak demand. That should have resulted in a savings for APS. Likewise APS can control several small generating stations either leaving them off line or reducing their operational hours which would save additional funds and equipment. If my memory is correct, the (I/2) R losses, which are transmission power losses, are a function of current squared. Hence by reducing the demand or current during the daylight hours the demand is lowered and the system is more efficient which benefits APS. I believe that is also why APS has a time of day electric rate.

8. Now again I am not a lawyer. However, I believe the action by APS establishing Net Metering and other incentives to entice customers to install solar and then incorporate a renewable energy benefit surcharge based upon the size of the solar installation primarily to recoup "potential" lost revenue is wrong. I see it as a classic **Bait and Switch** scenario. Could this result in a class action law suit? I don't know, however, I would suspect that the APS' response to such a suit, if one was originated, would be the same as when I questioned APS on the recent environmental benefit tariff. APS' response was that the Arizona Corporation Commission recommended and approved it. This implies that APS is placing the blame for these charges on the Arizona Corporation Commission.

9. Should my discussion for elimination of the environmental benefit surcharge fail to convince you that this charge is wrong and inappropriate, I am suggesting the following:

label this charge exactly what it is, that being APS cost avoidance or a profit enhancement charge to compensate APS for the cost of future electric power which may be provided at some future time. Perhaps the most equitable way to administer this charge would be to assess a monthly charge to every solar installation for every KWH carried over and banked for next month. This would be a one time charge, for example, ½ cents or \$0.005 per KWH. This should be equally fair to all, both big and small generators. It would not be accessed on the total solar power generated since most of that would be consumed on site and not placed on the grid. I believe that APS currently has all the equipment and

systems to accomplish this in place. Presently on each APS bill under **net electricity** are the KWH credits for the last month and the total net electricity, in KWH credits at the end of the current month. If there is increased amount of credits realized placed on the APS grid then a ½ cent per KWH would be assessed for the increased amount. At the end of the calendar year should there be a credit refund to the customer for KWH generated the refund should also include the ½ cent cost avoidance and be refunded to the generator since it was never needed or used.

I am not excited about the APS proposed method of having a few incremental or step Tariff charges and I perceive them unfair especially to small business owners with small systems. They would be charged a monthly rate and most likely use almost all the power that they generate and not placing much or any on the APS Grid. While on the other hand the larger customers would be assessed less per KWH generated. Therefore, I would think that a minimum of 8 to 10 increments would be a better fit for fairness with more steps at the lower generating capacity area. But I still don't believe it is the most equitable method.

My July APS bill had a demand of 24KW and included a demand charge of \$198 because the 20KW limit was exceeded. An environmental benefit surcharge of slightly over \$23 was also assessed. This is a 4 year old solar installation. I don't understand this \$23 charge. I would think that it would be most appropriate to incorporate it to the actual demand charge and established as uniform pricing policy. I think it would be wise to review APS billing practices on this matter to insure that some facilities are not being billed twice for the same environmental benefit charge.

10. Just as a side note, when I went on line to research APS and Pinnacle West I got a pop up on my screen titled Prosper. What I found interesting was that this pop up puts a spin on my understanding of the proposal now facing the Arizona Corporation Commission. Basically, it provided only APS side of the proposal and implies that all non-solar APS customers would have to reimburse APS for the cost of benefits that the solar customers receive at no cost. This pop up even included a direct link to the Arizona Corporation Commission telling them to support the APS proposal. I did a little research on this pop up and found that it was sponsored by Mr. Kirt Adams who claimed to be a former Arizona State Senator. This makes me wonder why he would spend his money to facilitate a popup web site for this issue and if Mr. Adams really understood the matter or was a paid lobbyist for APS.

Commissioner BitterSmith, I recently purchased a grid-tied photovoltaic electric system. I decided to purchase the system based on numerous factors including doing my part to help the environment and reducing personal energy costs including insulation from future rate increases. Arizona's current net metering policy was a deciding factor in committing the huge up-front cash outlay required to go solar (\$35.5K in my case). I also have a solar hot water system and am employing passive solar for home heating.

I am extremely concerned about Arizona Public Service's current attempt to gut the Arizona net metering policy. This sneaky "back door" tactic is entirely unacceptable. This policy, if allowed, will strongly discourage further wind and solar system implementation in Arizona by private citizens and businesses alike. Arizona will be seen nationally as a state that actively discourages use of alternative energy. This is especially significant since we have so many available energy producing days from both wind and solar.

I see the following negative impacts:

1) As I understand things, coal-fired utilities face significant fines under the current national energy policy. The cost from these fines will be passed on to consumers causing spiraling energy costs. Utilities can avoid most or all of these fines by achieving a certain percentage of alternative energy production. This is most easily achieved by a "distributed grid" system where private individuals install wind and solar systems, thus reducing the need for coal-fired electricity production. APS's proposal makes personal energy production unattractive and virtually insures failure to meet alternative energy goals.

2) As our state and national population continues to grow, more and more power will be needed. We can either build more plants or distribute the grid....your choice.

3) APS is stating that they will have to have (current) power plants on standby for cloudy days and other times when solar power is not being produced. Utilities produce power according to demand, so this simply means that they throttle back part of the time and produce more power when necessary. Also, it is doubtul that we in AZ will have days when a majority of the state is under cloud cover, so one area can typically "cover" for another.

4) Overloads, brownouts, blackouts, etc...can be significantly reduced as many of these occur during the summer when solar availability is extremely high. The more power we have available, the more options we have.

My name is Brian Murphy and I live in Goodyear, AZ where I am an APS customer. I am also a solar user and concerned about APS and their plans to change the way future solar users are compensated. We presently have a solar array that allows for our APS bill to be significantly reduced over the course of the last several months. The system is approaching a year of use at which point we will know the true benefit of our system.

We presently lease the system as we wanted to have a fixed electric bill, much like our fixed mortgage. Utility bills will only rise as energy continues to become more expensive over the long term. APS would like to change the way all future users of this program are compensated. This would not only affect our plan to have as close to a fixed utility bill as possible, but also seriously impact any future plans to sell our home. This plan will impact the buying decisions of new owners. At the suggested price of \$50-\$100 a month this would effectively remove any benefit a prospective buyer would have when looking at our home. While we have no plans to move, there is no doubt this would be an impact to our ability to sell. Depending on mortgage rates at the time this could be the difference of \$25,000 or more in purchase power. This may impact our decision should we need to move to a new home as well. We may avoid a solar home to avoid the APS imposed fees.

We are a solar panel installation customer of APS. We live in Prescott, AZ and are a very usage conscious customer for electrical usage. We are hooked to the grid and have been since March 2010 with our installation; prior to that we were a direct consumer of APS. We manage our usage; we rarely use air conditioning and rely upon fans and security doors to cool our home.

We implemented the installation with the thought in mind to equal our production with consumption, to put back to the grid what we used when there was no production capability. We pay APS a monthly fee for the meter, for meter reading, for billing, for our account plus all the applicable taxes.

There is a lot of discussion and a lot of negative advertising being done on the net metering issue. APS is using extreme measures to persuade the AZ residents to be against solar and to convince the Corporate Commission to decide against those who have invested in solar installations to produce energy and to try and assist with issues of pollution and resource consumption.

I was alerted by a campaign Greenpeace has going about this.

I agree that those who install solar panels and sell power back to the grid are making use of the power lines to do so. However I suspect that the rate hike APS is requesting is excessive.

There has always been a choice to install a bank of batteries to take care of nighttime power needs, especially common among those who live far enough out that they can't connect to the grid anyway. Selling power back to the power company is a convenient alternative to owning and maintaining batteries. Given that the grid already exists, it's also much better for the environment to use the grid in this way rather than filling a room with toxic chemical storage devices which must be replaced periodically. So I think it is in the best interest of the public to keep this option open and affordable. It's surprising that APS can't see for themselves that discouraging grid-tied systems would also encourage disconnecting from the grid entirely, which might be bad for their long-term business. If my roof was covered with panels and I had to pay \$100 per month just to connect to the grid, I'd buy the batteries and disconnect.

I live in Norway now. It's interesting that in Norway the power grid business is separated from the power generation business. I know that idea was discussed in Arizona before, and was not completed. It means that power generation is a very competitive business, while the grid ownership business (still a monopoly in each service area) must stand on its own income. So if you have signed up with two different companies then you pay two different bills (although the grid-owning company also offers the power itself, if you want to exchange a slightly higher rate for convenience). In my experience the two bills are about the same: distribution costs me about as much as generation.

It could be that the billing overhead outweighs the advantage of avoiding the monopoly in power generation. Using solar power on a large scale could potentially make that point moot in the long term; the power company would tend to evolve towards more focus on distribution and storage, and less generation. It's hard to compete with free power, and the distribution problem also becomes a smaller one if the power generation and usage are mostly co-located, while only a fraction of the total usage is actually being sent across the grid. Then the total losses in the distribution system become lower too. That's a very efficient situation to try to get into.

It's very strange to me that Arizona is not the world leader in solar power. Instead it seems to be places like Germany and Spain which do not have such an abundance of sunlight all year around, but nevertheless are bent on putting solar panels on every roof. There are so many sunny rooftops in Arizona that the state would be a net exporter on that basis alone, if every roof were covered with panels, in addition to all the hydro power and the nuclear plant. The way I see it, your job is to encourage that to happen. It's good for Arizona, good for everyone who lives there, good for the country and good for the environment. It would reduce the heat island effect in Phoenix to convert some of the incident energy into a useful form rather than absorbing and re-radiating all of it. And the more demand for solar panels, the cheaper they will get. A big chunk of the solar panel manufacturing industry would naturally tend to be based in Arizona in that case. (I realize that some of it already is.)

Disclaimer: as I said I live in Norway now. But I still own a home in Phoenix, and I expect that I might move back at some point. If so, I will be wanting to cover my roof with panels, too. I think the point where that investment reached the breakeven point was already a while ago. It's also in an SRP neighborhood, thank goodness...

I am a rooftop solar system lessee and a long time APS customer. I am on a plan that APS advised was the most appropriate given my solar system.

Recently you wrote me about APS and its solar credits per recent action with the ACC. You indicated that recent changes in the APS policy as to credits for generation from such customer systems would not significantly impact customers in a negative way. I beg to differ. My experience with APS following installation of a significant rooftop solar system is that my APS bills have gone up, not down.

Recently, for May and June, my APS bills have been approx.. \$675 and \$780 respectively, the highest APS bills I have received since I moved to Arizona in 1977. I need to know how I am being credited for my solar power, and why it is more expensive to go solar than to simply remain a traditional full utility customer. When I call APS, I get the run around and feel that I am merely a nuisance to the utility. APS needs a dedicated customer service rep for people who have gone solar. APS and the Arizona state government have encouraged people to use such systems to save energy, and the reward is confusing and shoddy responses from APS and worse, exorbitant costs.

In your July 12, 2013 correspondence, you thanked me and my family for going solar. Now I am wondering why in the world I did it. I need someone to explain to me why my APS costs are so high, why its difficult if not impossible to save money after investing in solar, and why my long-time utility provider seems ambivalent about green energy customers like myself. If APS is going to talk the solar talk, than kindly walk it as well. I can't imagine the Arizona Corporation

Commission envisioned these circumstances when considering rate arrangements and credits for APS and its solar customers. Kindly direct a competent and knowledgeable staff person to assist me in these circumstances. There has to be a reason I am paying record high bills after spending thousands of dollars on a rooftop solar system.

Dear Commissioners:

The new EPR-7 rate proposed by APS to the Arizona Corporation Commission requires residential solar-system customers pay the *difference* between the peak-demand APS retail rate of \$0.26 per kWh or more, and the wholesale rate of \$0.04 per kWh, JUST TO USE the electricity that they generate from their OWN solar panels, when connected to the APS grid.

Once again, under this rate, residential solar distributed-generation (DG) customers will be required to sell ALL of their generation to APS at the WHOLESALE rate and then pay the RETAIL rate for ANY electricity they use. I kid you not! They will pay \$0.21 per kWh to APS on-peak JUST to use electricity they generate themselves.

Without the current EPR-6 net-metering rate, future APS solar customers will have no alternative but to go completely OFF-GRID for photovoltaic (PV) generated power to make sense, economically. These customers WILL NOT pay for any future APS utility grid construction or maintenance.

A winter day's worth of my electric power use requires a 20 kWh battery for storage (40 kWh for summer) and is about the same capacity as the Nissan Leaf's electric-car battery (24.5 kWh).

Lead acid batteries of all types (FLA, AGM, HuP) have so many disadvantages (size, weight, maintenance, power loss when charging/discharging, limited charging cycles, limited depth of discharge, etc.) they cannot economically be used. Lithium-ion (safe LiFePO4) are the batteries of choice.

Inexpensive, modern 4-6 kW inverters (SMA "Sunny Island") with built-in 200-500% short-term overload capability can easily handle air conditioner startup and use. However, electric clothes dryer, water heater, and cooking range use may double the size of the needed inverter system.

I could easily survive the Arizona summer with only a 20 kWh battery while running only my air conditioner with a solar array and battery in a legal "generator backup" mode with NO CONNECTION to the APS grid.

Eliminating the current EPR-6 "net-metering" arrangement and a future drop in the price of Lithium-ion (LiFePO4) batteries could eventually increase the number of homeowners who would consider completely abandoning the APS grid when the economics make sense. (A 8.8 kW STC solar system costs about \$20,000 - add a 20 kWh battery and two additional inverters for about another \$20,000.)

At my residence, I pay around \$0.26 per kWh (independent of any taxes, fees, service charges, or assessments) for on-peak electricity in summer. I used about 232 kWh on-peak in June 2013, which amounts to \$60.32 (before taxes), over half of the the charge of \$110.02 total I paid for all electricity (on-peak and off-peak) before any taxes, assessments, or fees for "Customer account charge", "Metering", "Meter Reading", and "Billing". (My home is fairly energy efficient.)

Generating my own electricity during on-peak hours would save me perhaps \$600 annually. Generating ALL my own electricity would save at least \$1,300 annually, if I go completely off-grid.

If the proposed changes only grandfather the current owners and lessees and not the systems themselves, then the changes will devalue the properties and make them difficult to sell in the future. This region is just recovering from one of the worst periods of property value loss that I have ever seen. Please don't pass any laws/rules that will devalue my home any more that it already has. Instead of just grandfathering the current owners/lessees, a reasonable approach is to grandfather each existing residential system. Dear Commissioner's,

I am a retired senior citizen (71) and installed a \$30,000, 4.95 KW, solar system to my Scottsdale home three years ago. I made that decision based on what I considered to be logical environmental concerns as well as a reasonable expectation for payback for the expenditure with in my life time. I don't begin to generate enough electricity to keep from requiring electricity from the grid both at peak and off-peak. I have watched my electric bills ancillary charges (all items sans generating electricity) rise from July 2011 of 28.26 to 2013's 46.19. Both with similar usage. I can just about guarantee I will have to replace my inverters twice within a 20 year life cycle. I am responsible for cleaning and maintaining my system for 20 years per my commitment with APS. My system produces approximately 9500 kw a year, assuming 2 replacement inverters in a 20 yr cycle and a resultant cost basis of \$40,000 my cost per kw would be 21 cents. With rebates and tax incentives of approximately \$22,000 that would reduce the cost per kw to 9.5 cents. I have also learned and confirmed from APS, you have granted them a change in yearend credit valuation from .066 to .029 cents per kilowatt. Neither you or APS had advised me of this change and I find it perplexing at best.

So I have seen my ancillary costs consistently increase. My effective annual carryover of approximately 2000 kw go from .066 to .029 with a cost basis of .095. Do you see how I might feel like I am getting screwed? The whole argument of net metering is missing the point. I think all parties need to belly up to the bar and redraw a better footprint for all. I want to see APS covered on their costs to maintain the grid. I already feel I am contributing to the grid with my line item of "Delivery Service" going from 3.42 in July 2011 to 15.09 in July 2013. Then again cut my year end credit from a cost of \$190.00 to a potential credit of \$58.00, so there is blood in the water.

I think net metering is fair as a watt for a watt. My watt is as good as their watt. I also think if I would be charged .029 (or whatever is deemed fair) for the kw I ship into their system that would be fair as a payment in support of maintaining the grid. Be mindful the magnitude of the grid in verses the grid out is different. Probably the watt I ship out goes to my neighbor next door and runs through two meters both of which are supported by their own fees. APS gets paid for that watt at full market value, with almost no line loses, and at no cost to them. In turn they grant me a credit to ship me one of their watts at whatever their cost is for their watt. Payment by me for basic maintenance of the grid as part of those costs is not out of the question. If I end the year with a credit balance they then convert the watts I sent them to some contrived value below my cost of production. I think the reduction of the yearend valuation of my credit carry over is egregious. If I were to pay APS .029 in support of the grid and then receive .029 for credits at years end, those credits would become absolutely worthless, amounting to as in last years numbers a gift of \$190 worth of my watts to APS. The cost of my watt, won't go down. As it was last year I gave APS \$58 worth of my watts. I am aware of APS's grandfathering but I still feel an obligation to support the basic maintenance of the APS grid. To me that is best served with solar customers paying a grid maintenance fee for all watts in and out and not playing games with the end of year credit or Net Metering. At least realize we are paying into the system in support of the grid with the valuation of the year end credit.

Did I mention I consumed 4500 per year of electricity from my system that reduced my load on the grid and 5000 went back to the grid through net metering? That's a 9,500 kw net benefit to the APS system, essentially free from the sun and no carbon footprint.

I very fervently want to see solar thrive in the best solar state in our country. As a former airline Captain and Vietnam era fighter pilot I have seen the shrinking of the ice cap first hand and we have a huge problem. Solar is one of the answers. For you all to roll over is not an option. I voted for you, and I hope you will not let us down. The problem is far more complex than just "net metering". You all are in a position to redraw the landscape and put rational decisions into place. Go for it. We are starting to run out of options. My grandchildren are counting on you. And so am I. Please include my email in your docket correspondence.

As most of you know, APS has placed a proposal before the Corporation Commission that is intended to severely cripple the solar industry. Below is a copy of my email to all the Corporation Commissioners as well as Governor Jan Brewer. I urge you to look at this issue and contact them as I have done. The Corporation Commission's primary duty is to protect the consumer from monopolies such as this. Even if your utility is SRP or ED3, keep in mind that a policy change of this magnitude would be jumped on by all of them.

APS has started a large campaign (some of it by hidden sources) to achieve approval for this terrible policy change. It is largely misinformation and heavily slanted to try and curb the already heavy consumer outcry. Our current commissioners have a history of being utility friendly which is contrary to their actual responsibility to the consumer. As voters you should let them know how you feel.

APS would like to say that net-metering is the same thing as wholesale electrical purchases and that they should not be doing it "apples to apples" as it were. They want to only credit the meter at wholesale rates when it turns backwards and charge retail when it turns the normal way. They state that they are paying 5 times as much for the electricity as they would if they were buying it wholesale (from a coal-fired electrical plant as an example).

I feel this is an invalid comparison. Net metering is a result of a homeowner just using less of APS's electricity. Residential systems do not generally make more electricity than the house uses in the course of a year. Even when you have a credit balance <u>on December 15th</u>, APS only pays you wholesale rates for that electricity so the net result is you are NOT a wholesale electrical producer.

That said, APS does maintain a grid that homeowners use to store their electricity until they need it (like at night). They state that there should be a cost for using it. I feel that is what the basic service charge and other miscellaneous charges cover. You will notice that your bill, even when you over produce, still has some charges on it that do not go away (anywhere from \$9.00 - \$15.00).

So how do they justify these campaigns claiming solar is causing electric rates to go up? All that is really happening here is that solar customers just use less of it. If people wish to look at why APS rates go up then they should look closely at how APS is run. Having to repair/replace these old coal power plants might be one reason. How about all the money they just recently spent on changing their logo!?!

I'll guarantee that APS rates continue to go up even if they are able to torpedo solar.

"I am writing to express my opposition to the APS proposal presently before the Corporation Commission. In essence, APS wishes to curtail the solar industry by charging a very large monthly surcharge to customers who install solar and tie into the grid. They wish to eliminate the EPR-6 program and change the net metering from on-par to a wholesale/retail program.

As to the monthly surcharge (estimated at \$50-\$100); how does the utility in any way justify such an expense. There are pre-solar installations that have total bills less than \$100.00 per month at certain times of the year. As an example, can we imagine a pre-solar bill of \$75.00 for November that now becomes \$100.00 just because they added solar and used no electricity from APS?

Regarding the EPR-6 program. It was the Corporation Commission that made APS offer this program as an alternative to EPR-2 in the first place. Does the disparity issue no longer exist? It was considered unfair back then and now it does not? As a business APS does purchase electricity at wholesale and sell at retail. This makes sense but is not a fair comparison relating to the residential consumer. We are dealing here with homeowners who wish to look at an environmental alternative to conventional electrical generation and are thereby just using less. Homeowners should not be penalized just for doing the right thing.

Additionally, APS proposes increasing the incentive program which they have annually lowered to the point it hardly exists. Since the funds for the incentive program come directly from the surcharge on the consumer's utility bill (and not from APS corporately), this is nothing more than a smoke screen to try and appease the critics of their proposal and is not really part of the issue at hand.

The Corporation Commission is mandated with <u>PROTECTING</u> the consumer from monopolies. If this is not the foremost consideration then we need to look closely at who we have representing that fact within the Commission. APS states that they need this additional income to provide a grid for the consumers to use and downplay the benefits that rooftop solar plays in reduced transmission lines. This tax (and that is exactly what it is) is unwarranted and unfair. APS would like us to think they are a solar advocate but nothing could be farther from the truth. They propose this tax since they are unwilling to alter their business model and properly embrace a technology that is coming whether they want it to or not.

I ask the Corporation Commissioners to look closely at what is done nationally and protect the consumer from this outrageous course of action. We all have an obligation to reduce the carbon footprint we leave and this would be a huge step backwards in the process. Arizona needs to be a frontrunner in solar and renewable energy. Please do not let us fall behind."

I have data for my electrical consumption for the past 30+ years and I am coming up on 4 years of being on roof top solar – I am only saving \$1000 a year on my APS bill since going solar – and APS wants it back....If you look at the APS examples you will see APS is proposing that new roof top solar customers subsidize a portion of what APS considers costs the roof top solar customers do not use (page 3 of reference web page PDF file) – "there are still costs that solar customers do not pay, such as substations, power lines, poles and other infrastructure. That amounts to a subsidy of about \$1,000 per year for each solar installation, or \$20,000 over a lifetime – paid by all customers without rooftop solar". APS should have been aware of these costs and considerations when they implemented a roof top solar program. These proposed charges are not fair to the APS roof top solar customers and will zero out any savings of the roof top solar systems. I feel this proposal will decimate any roof top solar program. Also, it is my understanding that roof top solar customers do pay those proposed charges on the KWs drawn from the APS grid during non solar generating periods.

Also, I received a notice with this month's APS bill that effective July 1 the rebate for solar excess, which is tied to the price of natural gas, is being reduced by 2/3. I have not found anything or anyone; yes I have talked to APS, which can explain why the rebate for excess solar energy is tied to the price of natural gas. APS representatives have stated that the rebate rate is tied to the price of natural gas by the Arizona Corporation Commission and further explained the price of natural gas in 2009, when the rate was established, was at an all time high and has dropped since and is now being adjusted accordingly. However, can someone at the commission explain to me why the rebate rate is tied to the price of natural gas and also elaborate on why the rebate rate is not tied to something comparable to the cost of generating a KW rather than a component of generating a KW.

Hello,

I wanted to keep you abreast of what has happen the past week. We discovered two separate items that APS has not been forthcoming about and <u>they do effect you</u>.

The first is that they met behind closed doors with the ACC and got the buyback credit at the end of the year changed from their wholesale rate (The average of what it cost them to produce electricity) to the cost of their natural gas production. (The cheapest way they generate electricity at this time) It is going to reduce your year end buy back from approximately \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh. The change was made without anyone being aware that it was being considered.

The second is that APS is requesting that the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and a Solar Monthly Fee only be extended to the person that currently has the solar system. The person that buys your house will not get the same benefits you receive. It will reduce the value of your system to the new homeowner and negatively impact your sale. It was believed that the "grandfather" clause was for the system and you could use that as a selling tool.

I encourage you to contact the commissioners at the ACC and let them know you are upset that they renegotiated the buyback calculator with APS without informing the public it was up for discussion. I also encourage you to let them know that you will not accept the "grandfather" clause not being extended to whomever purchases your home. You made your decision to go solar with these items included in the decision process and it isn't reasonable for them to change the rules in the middle of the game.

Dear AZ Corp Comission,

I am an Arizona APS customer. I survive now on my Social Security at age 68.

I took most of my savings and purchased a rooftop solar array. I knew that Obama was going to do everything he could to make electricity very expensive;

that is what he said in one of his speeches. He said that he would make electricity so expensive that few could afford it. (Check his history of speeches on this.) Now he's forcing the coal plants out of business too.

Each and every giant windmill today that cost about \$1 million cannot pay for themselves because the General Electric automatic transmissions in the towers are a high maintenance item. These windmills cannot create enough electricity during their life expectancy to pay for themselves before they totally wear out. Without federal subsidy, no private company would invest in these and get enough return to compensate their investors.

I make almost all of my own consumed electricity at this residence, but because of the laws, the system is designed so that I cannot make electricity through my inverters unless my system sees 60 Hertz on the APS/SRP line. The reason for this law is to insure that a APS/SRP repair man will not be electrocuted if the supply line from APS of SRP goes down for any reason and they need to make repairs. My system might electrocute a line man if it was able to back feed. The other solution is for me to totally get off of the grid and then I have to create my own 60 Hertz frequency to trick the system into working.

For excess electricity that my high maintenance batteries cannot store, the APS rate of return is far less than what it would charge someone else for electricity.

Even so, with all of the Federal Tax Credit and the SRP/APS installation check, it will take me more than 30 years to recoup the investment that I had to pay out of my pocket. Now after all of this, I find out that my system only has a guaranteed 15 year life expectancy.

Yes, I bought my system years ago and the cost of solar panels has dropped significantly since then. Your flyer to Arizona consumers is a lie as far as I am concerned.

Obviously the Arizona flyer really made me mad at 60+ org. Where did they get all of the funds to create the elaborate an prejudicial flyer. As far as I am concerned the 60+ flyer is irresponsible.

I am a recent solar customer. Here is my experience with APS.

1. APS limits the number of panels a customer can install to max of 36 even if they need more to generate 100% of there usage.

2. We are on the same rate plan as pre-solar therefore we pay exactly the same as before for usage of non-solar electricity (how is this unfair to APS or other customers)

3. The solar company installs a meter at the APS inspection but APS did not install their meter until I called them. We generated 1121 units of electricity but were credited with only 871 because the APS meter was not installed on the turn on APS inspection day. Therefore APS received 250 units that they did not have to pay for. They explained to me that they only credit from their meter reading. { Speaking of meter readings WHY is the charge for this different every month } {Does the meter reader get paid differently every month?}

4. Two other non related points for you to think about The metering; customer account charge and billing charges also vary monthly. Surely these should be fixed rates?

I have also noticed several schools and parking facilities installing massive amounts of panels. Are limits imposed of them? I think not.

I wanted to keep you abreast of what has happen the past week. We discovered two separate items that APS has not been forthcoming about and <u>they do effect you</u>.

The first is that they met behind closed doors with the ACC and got the buyback credit at the end of the year changed from their wholesale rate (The average of what it cost them to produce electricity) to the cost of their natural gas production. (The cheapest way they generate electricity at this time) It is going to reduce your year end buy back from approximately \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh. The change was made without anyone being aware that it was being considered.

The second is that APS is requesting that the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and a Solar Monthly Fee only be extended to the person that currently has the solar system. The person that buys your house will not get the same benefits you receive. It will reduce the value of your system to the new homeowner and negatively impact your sale. It was believed that the "grandfather" clause was for the system and you could use that as a selling tool.

I encourage you to contact the commissioners at the ACC and let them know you are upset that they renegotiated the buyback calculator with APS without informing the public it was up for discussion. I also encourage you to let them know that you will not accept the "grandfather" clause not being extended to whomever purchases your home. You made your decision to go solar with these items included in the decision process and it isn't reasonable for them to change the rules in the middle of the game.

I am home owner in Goodyear, Arizona and my wife and I recently acquired a lease for a solar power system (Solar City) that we paid for in full (20yr). I understand that some drastic changes were imposed recently without our knowledge or our input being considered.

I understand that there was a meeting behind closed doors with the ACC resulting in the buyback credit at the end of the year changed from their wholesale rate (The average of what it cost them to produce electricity) to the cost of their natural gas production. This "is not" what we expected when we purchased our Solar City lease. Now that we are on contract, the rules have changed. If I am to understand correctly this would mean that at the end of the year, the buyback amount would change from approximately \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh. This was a deal done between ACC and APS, without the public's knowledge. This is over a 50% loss to what we would expect at year end. I don't understand (I am no lawyer) how you can arbitrarily reduce what I am to be paid back, with any vote, etc. If I tried this with my personal finances, I would be accused of fraud and sent to jail.

Also it's our understanding that APS requested the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and the Solar Monthly Fee, only be extended to the person that currently has the solar system. If this is correct, and I will my house to boy when my wife and I have died, then he will not benefit by our decision to go solar. Analyzing the APS proposals to slash solar net metering

8/5/13 – Dillon Holmes

A great many of the letters, articles, and write-ups regarding the APS proposals to modify net metering have missed a number of important details. Below is my attempt to uncover the truth and reopen the discussion.

The APS Technical Conferences

Facts

Late last year, the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC), which regulates APS, required that the utility host a series of Technical Conferences to determine the true financial effects of the successful Net Metering program which has dramatically boosted rooftop solar adoption in Arizona. APS complied and held several meetings earlier this year.

The idea behind the open forum was to involve other utilities, the solar industry, and the public to determine if the current program merited modification.

Opinions

The Technical Conferences were largely a formality that ignored much of the opinions and recommendations from all parties other than APS themselves.

A number of audience members expressed well-researched, valid concerns and objections that were largely dismissed by APS staff with, "Your comments have been added to the record."

At no point was there ever a truly open discussion where either side of the aisle engaged the other in what today's society would consider a conversation or debate.

The Conclusion of the Technical Conferences

Facts

Last month APS submitted to the ACC their proposed solutions to what they have determined to be a problem with residential solar.

APS claims that residential solar customers avoid \$1,000 per year in infrastructure costs while still requiring the grid to function. Multiply this by the 18,000 current solar customers and that adds up to roughly \$18 million per year that APS says must be recovered through rate hikes. By their math, if you divide \$18 million by the 1.1 million non-solar customers, that is an expense of under \$17 per year per non-solar customer. However, APS claims that the average solar system costs APS \$20,000 over its lifetime.

There are several reports that argue the exact opposite effect, that solar actually saves all parties money due to a reduced need for power plant and transmission upgrades. (Click here for a copy of one such report.)

Opinions

APS cited their own study only, claiming that solar costs APS \$18 million per year which must be recovered in the form of rate hikes that disproportionately affect non-solar customers since they are provided all of their power from APS.

Likewise, the solar industry provided a report that concluded that the current net metering policies save APS \$34 million each year.

Though both studies are likely biased to at least some degree, only the APS report has been considered in the overall findings of the technical conferences. The APS response was simply that they do not agree with the competing report and have used only their own study to craft their proposed changes to the net metering program.

The APS Proposals

Facts

APS has proposed two solutions that will dramatically modify the way solar customers are compensated for the power produced by their systems.

1. The first proposed change is that solar customers be required to change their rate plan to one which includes demand charges. In other words, their solar system might offset a large percentage of their overall power consumption, but as long as there is an hour in a given month where their peak demand from the grid jumps (due to clouds or extreme heat requiring additional cooling), they are going to be paying the full demand charge as if they had practically no solar at all.
2. The second proposal by APS is shifting from net metering to net billing. Instead of receiving retail value credit (roughly 13 cents today averaged out) for power you temporarily send back to the grid, APS would like to pay the wholesale rate of power (around 5 cents or less). In the meantime they will take the extra power generated and instantly sell it to a neighbor at the retail rate. Likewise, when a solar customer needs that extra power back (such as at night or during a cloudy day), they will buy it back at a retail rate as well.

Additional Proposal: As a side note, APS has also suggested that they support an increase in upfront solar subsidies regardless of which of the two proposals is implemented. This same subsidy has been in place for years but has gradually diminished to almost zero. It has been funded through the Environmental Benefits Surcharge (click here for an APS description) and is assessed on all APS customer monthly bills regardless of whether or not they have solar.

Opinions

Either of the two APS proposals will hurt residential rooftop solar by creating a system less conducive to sustainable industry growth due to greater dependence on subsidies.

1. The first proposal simply transfers the variable cost of power over to a fixed cost that will become practically unavoidable due to the nature of demand. (APS already pulled this off for large commercial net metering last year and no one even noticed.) Solar cannot offset demand, so when APS transfers the cost from kilowatt hour (kWh) units of power (making them cheaper) to kilowatt (kW) demand charges (making them more expensive), solar customers will be paying almost as much as they were before they had solar.

2. The second proposal means that when a customer temporarily sends power back to the grid (usually during peak hours), they will be immediately compensated for it at wholesale rates. Currently, when a customer sends power back to the grid, that power is added up and then netted out with the amount of power that they consume from APS on a monthly basis, so that the customer is charged only for what they actually use.

Typically, a customer overproduces power during peak hours when the kWh is most expensive. At that moment, APS sells that extra power to the neighbors at peak retail rates. Then, when power is inexpensive at night, that same solar customer will pull that power back from the grid. In other words, APS will already have profited on the sale of that extra power during peak hours. When the solar customer wants it back, APS only has to give them off-peak power, saving APS money.

APS themselves said that either proposal will likely cost solar customers \$50-100 more each month, essentially slashing the energy savings that make solar such a sensible and desirable investment.

The snag is that APS is required to have more solar on the grid each year as mandated by the ACC, so they need a system that will not entirely annihilate the solar industry as their two base proposals would. Therefore, APS included in their proposal a word of support for upfront utility solar incentives to offset the reduced return-on-investment that would be consequential to their two core proposals.

Upfront solar subsidies are paid by all customers through the Environmental Benefits Surcharge, but APS's entire claim is that net metering in its current form results in additional unfair costs to non-solar customers. Then why is APS proposing to increase subsidies which are paid by the same body of people? If their plan is successful, APS will get their lost revenue back while still increasing the costs to non-solar customers through the Environmental Benefits Surcharge.

In other words, solar in today's form is costing APS too much money, which they then must charge to other customers as rate hikes to maintain historic revenue figures. (APS calls this an unfair "cost shift" from solar customers to non-solar customers.) Their proposed solution is to charge solar customers more while at the same time providing them greater upfront rebates to avoid snuffing out the industry entirely. The disconnect here is that upfront utility solar rebates are directly paid by customers. Not a single cent of an APS solar rebate is actually paid with APS dollars. No one is convinced the current claimed cost-shift even exists, but APS's new proposal will undoubtedly create one through increased subsidies paid by all customers.

When the ACC first mandated that APS provide 15% renewable energy by 2025 through the Renewable Energy Standard (RES), APS added the Environmental Benefits Surcharge to fund it through customer fees. In essence, APS installed a no-cost method of meeting their mandated standard.

However, they forgot to account for lost revenue due to the adoption of solar power. To remedy this, they have proposed a method that will both fund the RES requirement (as it has since its adoption) and recover lost revenue due to customers installing their own power plants.

Current system:

1. All rate payers pay less into the APS Environmental Benefits Surcharge.

Solar rebates are thankfully almost a thing of the past, meaning rate payers would no longer be subsidizing the upfront cost of solar through the APS Environmental Benefits Surcharge. This is wonderful and is already the case for commercial solar. (True renewable energy advocates recognize subsidies as a necessary evil on the road to creating a sustainable industry that will stand on its own.)

2. Every solar system installed results in less revenue for APS.

Intuitively, when a customer installs a solar system, they buy less power, and the power company makes less money. The solar homeowner has introduced competition into an industry dominated by a regulated monopoly.

Proposed System:

1. Rate payers pay more into the APS Environmental Benefits Surcharge.

APS claims to be concerned about solar customers costing non-solar customers money. However, they are proponents of charging all of their customers a greater surcharge in the form of a solar rebate. On the one hand APS complains that non-solar customers are subsidizing solar customers. On the other hand, APS proposes to increase solar subsidies paid by the same group of customers.

2. Every solar system installed has very little effect on APS revenue.

APS would like to butcher net metering to artificially shift variable power consumption costs to fixed unavoidable costs for solar customers. APS will stop losing money to solar. In fact, they will likely make more money from solar over time. Think about it: APS will recover most of their lost revenue, and solar panels will be on rooftops producing power that APS no longer needs to supply through the grid. They have found a way to benefit from their customers' solar investments.

Conclusion

APS claims non-solar customers pay more since the utility must raise their rates to offset lost revenue due to solar customers that provide power for themselves. The widely debated argument is whether APS is simply losing money by selling less power (mathematics proves this to be true), or APS is not being compensated properly for the use of their grid. They have not provided much legible evidence supporting the latter.

Understandably, APS does not want to lose money as they do in the current system. To protect themselves, they must craft a way to convince the majority of the state that more solar means bigger bills for everyone else. This will justify their bringing the above two proposed changes to the table.

Their cunning solution is simple: win the hearts and minds of non-solar customers by claiming that the current method is costing them money. Then propose a solution that will make APS more money. But this alone would kill solar, and APS is required to have more solar on the grid each year as mandated by the ACC. So at the same time they are gaining support from non-solar customers by claiming to save them money, APS must also increase upfront solar rebates, thus quietly taxing all customers more money to subsidize solar installations.

Not only will APS stop losing money to solar, they will likely make money from solar at the expense of those that have actually invested in clean technology. The new solar rate plans will dramatically reduce the negative impact solar has on APS total revenues. But the sun is still shining and solar panels will still be producing the same amount of power they always have. In other words, APS has won back their lost revenue and they don't even have to produce all that energy they once did before solar came about. For that reason, their bottom line profits will grow with every new residential solar installation.

APS claims that solar customers are "shifting costs" onto non-solar customers when really solar customers are just costing APS in lost revenue. With the new proposals, APS will shift the costs from themselves onto their rate payers...all of their rate payers.

APS <u>continually claims</u> solar has a bright future in Arizona, and if their plan works it would be the brightest future ever imaginable...but only for APS.

Their plan is both ingenious and miserably devastating.

APS's proposals fail to solve anything. Here are the questions that APS never answered and an explanation of what we need now.

This post is meant to follow my previous post analyzing the effects of the APS proposals.

The Technical Conferences hosted by APS failed to meet the intent of the mandate by the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC). The discussion was biased and the educated opinions of the audience were largely ignored.

Here is what we need now.

Solar owners do not wish to cause undue hardship on anyone. A true solar advocate favors solar over conventional energy because it brings clean energy and sustainability to Arizona.

We of all people advocate the gradual reduction of subsidies such that solar may one day stand on its own two feet. If there is a flaw in the sustainability model of solar, it is in our own collective best interest to determine where the problem lies so that we may find a solution that benefits all parties and ensures an actual<u>"bright future"</u> for solar and clean energy in Arizona.

For that reason, the solar industry embraced the APS Technical Conferences with open arms. We were hopeful that this would shed some light on the true effects of net metering, but our goals have not been met. Our questions have not been answered, and we have only strayed further from the path to a sustainable energy future, one that has potential to blaze the trail for bordering states presented with the same situation.

We want to know the truth.

How much is solar benefiting or costing our utility companies?

Why won't APS show us their numbers?

APS ignores solar studies in favor of their own, but this is to be expected. Both are likely biased at least somewhat. APS tell us that solar customers are costing them \$18 million each year and growing, but we have not seen a single line of the formula that leads them to this figure. Solar studies have determined the opposite effect, that solar is saving utilities almost twice that each year.

We need to sit down with both studies and dig through them line by line to determine where the discrepancies are so that we can uncover the truth.

If solar is costing APS \$1,000 per year per system in lost infrastructure costs, how much is lost due to reduced power generation revenue?

Of the entire bundled rate of retail power, what percentage is power sales and what percentage is grid infrastructure?

Is this proportionally in line with the \$1,000 solar claim by APS?

Is this ratio in line with other utilities in the region?

If APS is going to propose dramatic changes to our rate structures then we deserve to know the whole truth. I have a feeling APS has chosen this \$1,000 per solar customer per year figure to offset not only their lost fixed costs but also their lost variable revenue from power sales. They have made no effort to show stakeholders how they have come up with these numbers. Surely they don't expect us simply to trust them in their position.

If APS is so concerned with solar customers costing non-solar customers in the form of rate hikes, why then are they proposing increased upfront subsidies which tax the same body of people?

Why hasn't APS suggested an amount for the upfront subsidy increase?

Who would be responsible for determining this amount, and how would we do so without seeing the math behind the rest of APS's claims?

Solar advocates are sick of this gridlock. If there is a problem, we want to determine what it is so that we may fix it forever. But it is apparent that the APS proposed changes miss the mark. Perhaps we will determine that solar saves the utility money or perhaps we will determine the opposite, but we are not going to get there until we have an open and honest discussion, one which we have not been afforded at this point.

Hello,

I wanted to keep you abreast of what has happen the past week. We discovered two separate items that APS has not been forthcoming about and <u>they do effect you</u>.

The first is that they met behind closed doors with the ACC and got the buyback credit at the end of the year changed from their wholesale rate (The average of what it cost them to produce electricity) to the cost of their natural gas production. (The cheapest way they generate electricity at this time) It is going to reduce your year end buy back from approximately \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh. The change was made without anyone being aware that it was being considered.

The second is that APS is requesting that the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and a Solar Monthly Fee only be extended to the person that currently has the solar system. The person that buys your house will not get the same benefits you receive. It will reduce the value of your system to the new homeowner and negatively impact your sale. It was believed that the "grandfather" clause was for the system and you could use that as a selling tool.

I encourage you to contact the commissioners at the ACC and let them know you are upset that they renegotiated the buyback calculator with APS without informing the public it was up for discussion. I also encourage you to let them know that you will not accept the "grandfather" clause not being extended to whomever purchases your home. You made your decision to go solar with these items included in the decision process and it isn't reasonable for them to change the rules in the middle of the game.

My name is Shane Simpson. Recently, I have been informed of some of the proposed and accepted changes the Arizona Corporation Commission has made regarding solar owners and renters in Arizona. These changes will have a detrimental impact on myself and my family.

We first decided to get solar two years ago while finishing our house remodel. We designed the roof and floor plan specifically for solar optimization. The only question from there was how to pay for the solar. We decided to pay the 20 year lease through Solar City up front to realize the fastest return on investment and to reduce the liability of an unpaid lease on the potential sale of my house. We have no plans to move, but we consider all options and variables prior to making this kind of decision.

At this point we had the house complete and all the information we could get on our solar options. We had motive and opportunity but still lacked the means. We decided to refinance our house, as we had created an appreciation in value roughly equal to the cost of the solar by remodeling. We came to this decision by looking at the following factors.

• the overall reduction in our cost of living by eliminating our electric bill

- the buyback credit rate APS had instituted at the time (\$0.06 /kwh)x
- how long it would take us to recover fully from the investment
- what the overall return on the investment would be compare to other opportunities
- the increased value of the house having no electric bill and a solar array

The change of the buyback credit from \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh significantly impacts EVERY factor we put into our decision for solar. It diminishes the reduction in our cost of living, increases the time it will take to recover our investment, reduces our return on investment, and decreases the sales value of our home by reducing the ROI.

The change to the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and a Solar Monthly Fee ONLY be extended to the person that currently has the solar system will similarly reduce the value of our home with solar.

I have a very firm grasp of business, politics, and most of all economic principals and realities. What the ACC and APS are attempting to do flies in the face of transparency and fairness. APS called for their customers to "go solar", laid forth the terms, vetted solar contractors, and streamlined the process. They got what they asked for; we went solar based on the terms and economic environment. APS has a fiduciary duty to honor the terms they set forth. The ACC has a political duty to enforce the terms. The State Politicians have a fiduciary and political duty to ensure it happens. Any arrangement other than honoring the terms in which myself and other Arizona Solar Owners have purchased solar under can loosely be described as "Theft by Conversion" and very specifically described as "Dereliction of Duty".

I am outraged at the decisions the Arizona Corporation Commission is making lately regarding residential solar panels.

For years now, as an APS customer, I have been showered with information from APS encouraging me to install solar panels on my home. They told me it was good for the environment. They said it would save me money each month and raise the value of my home. About 11 months ago, after extensive research, we decided to install solar panels on our roof. The decision was based on a desire to help the environment but also on the positive economics of installing a solar voltaic system on our home.

Now APS is attempting to make the grandfathering of Net Metering and the Solar Monthly Fee only good for me and not for the system. This means that when I sell my home the solar system will be much less desirable for the buyer making it more difficult to sell my home and reducing its overall value.

It is also unacceptable that you are allowing APS to reduce the electricity buyback rate from 6 cents per kWh to 2.5 per kWh. Especially since most of the power I produce is during peak rates and resold to others at a rate of 24 cents per kWh. I have committed to a lease payment of \$117 per month for 20 years. Now you are allowing APS to change all the rules that were in place when I made this commitment. A commitment that APS encouraged me to make.

You must not allow APS to restrict the grandfather clause to only me and not to the system itself. If you do, it will be a huge financial burden to me. Further more you should require the buy back rate to return to the 6 cent per kWh that it was when APS convinced us to go solar.

Dear Ms Bitter-Smith;

The purpose of this message is to oppose the APS proposal to renege on their original inducements for the installation of rooftop solar power. The APS plan to rewrite an implied contract where they induced me to spend substantial upfront costs for the promise of future benefits is morally wrong, unjust, and dishonest on its face.

I am one of those Arizona residents who believed what APS said regarding the benefits to the State and the homeowner with respect to the installation of rooftop solar panels for the generation of electricity. To that end, I was one of the early installers – signed my contract in December 2008, and was operational in June 2009. My goal at that time was to provide sufficient power to run my home so that I could be essentially free of daytime APS support and also provide a significant backup to the APS grid so that they could reduce their future new construction requirements. I maximized the number of panels on my roof (126 at an out-of-pocket cost of \$34,991). I am 79 years old and recognized that I would not live long enough for the system to ever pay for itself, but an important factor in my decision process was the knowledge that I was helping the State solve future energy needs and whoever bought my home would have a substantial electrical power benefit that would be reflected in the sales price.

Shortly after my system was installed, by asserting that it would be much cheaper, APS convinced me to switch from the 7 to 7 time-of-use billing plan that I had been on for many years, to the standard billing plan. By the

time I realized that this was a lie, my previous time-of-use billing plan was no longer available. I did switch to the currently available 7 to noon time-of-use billing plan and will see, in the long run, whether that is cheaper or more expensive. Whichever is the case, I have completely lost any confidence I may have had that APS is looking out for the customer. If there were some way for me to go back to my original set up before solar, and recoup my original investment, I would seriously consider it.

At the present time, the Corporation Commission is the homeowner's only hope for an equitable outcome. APS must not be allowed to renege on their original contract commitment. A grandfather clause is inadequate because I made my investment with the knowledge that the crediting inducements would continue through the life of the system (25-50 years), not some arbitrary time that would protect the APS profit margin. I am relying on you and your colleagues to do the right thing and protect the homeowner.

I wanted to keep you abreast of what has happen the past week. We discovered two separate items that APS has not been forthcoming about and <u>they do effect you</u>.

The first is that they met behind closed doors with the ACC and got the buyback credit at the end of the year changed from their wholesale rate (The average of what it cost them to produce electricity) to the cost of their natural gas production. (The cheapest way they generate electricity at this time) It is going to reduce your year end buy back from approximately \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh. The change was made without anyone being aware that it was being considered.

The second is that APS is requesting that the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and a Solar Monthly Fee only be extended to the person that currently has the solar system. The person that buys your house will not get the same benefits you receive. It will reduce the value of your system to the new homeowner and negatively impact your sale. It was believed that the "grandfather" clause was for the system and you could use that as a selling tool.

I encourage you to contact the commissioners at the ACC and let them know you are upset that they renegotiated the buyback calculator with APS without informing the public it was up for discussion. This being cause by a recent ACC ruling that changes my electrical recovery from the fair wholesale rate of .06KW hour to a lesser recovery of .025 based on gas generation.

I am not one that claims to understand everything that goes into consideration for these types of decisions. I realize that APS has to maintain a fair profit and you are those that ensure the public is protected from excessive industry recovery. In that you have done a very good job and I compliment you for that.

I wanted to keep you abreast of what has happen the past week. We discovered two separate items that APS has not been forthcoming about and <u>they do effect you</u>.

The first is that they met behind closed doors with the ACC and got the buyback credit at the end of the year changed from their wholesale rate (The average of what it cost them to produce electricity) to the cost of their natural gas production. (The cheapest way they generate electricity at this time) It is going to reduce your year end buy back from approximately \$.06/kwh to \$.025/kwh. The change was made without anyone being aware that it was being considered.

The second is that APS is requesting that the "grandfather" clause concerning Net Metering and a Solar Monthly Fee only be extended to the person that currently has the solar system. The person that buys your house will not get the same benefits you receive. It will reduce the value of your system to the new homeowner and negatively impact your sale. Dear Commissioners:

Without net-metering, APS solar customers will have no alternative in future years but to go off-grid, for solar power to make sense, economically.

When it becomes possible (in the future) to economically and independently generate residential solar electricity by day, and to economically store solar energy for use at night, without the traditional net-metering arrangement many Arizona residents may disconnect **COMPLETELY** from the APS grid and they will not pay for **ANY** of its infrastructure fixed/maintenance costs.

I did an analysis. It will certainly be within the reach of many affluent Arizona homeowners to leave the APS grid. However, an energy storage system is necessary and will double the cost of a complete solar system.

A day's worth of my electric power requires a 25 kWh battery for storage (air conditioner, water heater, electric range), and is about the same capacity as the Nissan Leaf's electric-car battery.

Lead acid batteries of all types (FLA, AGM, HuP) have so many disadvantages (size, weight, maintenance, power loss when charging/discharging, limited charging cycles, limited depth of discharge, etc.) they cannot economically be used. Lithium-ion (safe LFI) are the batteries of choice.

Inexpensive, modern 4-6 kW inverters (SMA "Sunny Island") with built-in 200-500% short-term overload capability can easily handle air conditioner startup and use. However, electric clothes dryer and electric cooking range-use may need to double the size of the inverter ystem.

Eliminating the current "net-metering" arrangement could eventually increase the number of homeowners who will consider to completely abandon the APS grid when the economics make sense. (An 8.8 kW STC system costs about \$19,000 - add a 20 kWh battery and inverters for about another \$15,000.)

Have you considered the unintended consequences that will result if you eliminate the current EPR-6 net-metering rate?

In June of last year my wife and I made the decision to install Solar in our home. We are both in our mid-70's and our major source of income is Social Security plus a small pension we receive from my wife's exemployer. As we decided to go with a pre-paid lease plan, this decision had a significant impact on our retirement nest egg reducing our capital by 10% (about \$9,000.) We did this because of the security solar offered to our retirement monthly expenses and a sense of responsibility to do our part to help the environment. We didn't purchase the solar as it would have taken 30% of our retirement cash and since our income is so low we have no taxes to be offset by the tax credits. My health is not very good and I personally was trying to plan for the future of my wife having to live alone on a significantly reduced income. In late December the system was installed and performed as expected. Because of our roof area, the system was quoted to produce about 80+% offset of our monthly bill. For the Spring months our APS bill was \$30-35, in June about \$60 and July \$130. We fully expected and planned for these expenditures. Now APS want's to change the ball-game. Not only for new solar customers but also for our installation. We were originally told this would be a benefit if we choose to sell our home and move into nursing care. Now we hear their will be no grandfathering the system for possible subsequent owners of our home. We feel totally double-crossed by APS, the Utility Commission and should you approve this change, your commission. Why is it tax credits and the government and corporate breaks are always given to those that don't need them. Massive tax credits for electric cars and electric golf carts, etc while those with little income have to continue sacraficing food and medicine just to buy gas for a older vehicle to get back and forth to work. I've explained my wife and I's situation. We've been hard working middle-class people our entire life looking

Dear Commissioner Bitter-Smith,

I am writing to you to ask for your support in the upcoming attempt by APS to increase the rates of solar energy customers. In December 2012, we withdrew \$20,777 from our savings to pay for a 20 year lease of solar panels (To buy it would have cost \$30,000). We looked at our electricity costs and researched the costs associated with solar energy to see if this would be a financially advantageous way to go for us (retired). Based on encouragement from APS literature and information provided on the web by a variety of sources, we decided that we would save money over the long run. We were especially encouraged by the APS incentives which included buying back any electricity excess to that which we use each month. While we never expected to make any significant money from this (and we have not made any), we did feel that this buy back process was fair.

We were told that APS pays solar customers an amount 5 times what they pay their their fossil fuel sources for this excess electricity. Frankly I always thought this was too good to be true (and it is). I have to wonder if this figure equates to APS routinely charging their residential customers 5 times what they pay their sources for it. We have never gotten any payment, (never mind 5 times the amount they claim they pay us), and I don't expect we ever will. As I understand the system,

payment would only occur at the end of the year if the there is a balance overage. I've always felt that as long as APS was giving me the same amount for the excess electricity my system produces for their grid, that they were charging me, I wouldn't complain.

Now, having used our system for only 5 1/2 months, APS is appealing to the council to not only renege on their "incentive", but to add a charge of \$50 to \$100 to the bill of solar users. They make the self serving claim that solar users are paying less for the grid than non solar users. What kind of double talk is that? In all the years of paying for my non solar electricity there has never been any separate charge to pay for the grid. I am an engineer that previously worked for the power industry. The power meter products I worked on were designed to reduce the peak load that power companies needed to generate during system stress periods. These products are valued by the power industry because they reduce the need to build new power generating facilities. Homeowner solar installations are another piece of this peak power reduction goal. I am an Arizona voter, a solar installation owner, and an APS customer. I am writing to urge you to protect net-metering.

Net metering ensures that solar customers like us receive fair credit for the valuable clean power we deliver to the grid for others to use during the day. Homeowner solar installations reduce the state's power consumption requirements during the peak system stress periods in the summer months. Homeowner solar installations delay (and, hopefully will eventually eliminate) the need for APS to create more expensive power generating stations for our state. This is not just a benefit to APS, but it is also a benefit to all Arizona residents. Even though APS says that they will "grandfather" our installation, <u>APS's past and current</u> <u>efforts of adding tariffs to solar owners and attempts to restructure solar rates clearly shows</u> <u>their intent to eventually eliminate all meaningful benefits to homeowners with solar panel</u> <u>installation</u>.

Our household installed a 20 year leased solar panel system. If APS eventually eliminates our net metering, or adjusts our rates to reduce the benefits of net metering in the future, our household will be penalized twice:

- The electricity generated from our solar installation is not "free". We are paying for every kilowatt-hour that we generate through our 20 year equipment lease. The power that we generate in excess of our usage (that we are fully paying for in our lease) would become a windfall profit for APS with no benefit to us. This would be, in effect, an additional payment from us to APS not in dollars, but in generated power that we already paid for. APS would get that power for free and charge other customers for it.
- Aside from the larger annual total billing that we would be paying to APS, we would also end up paying more to our solar panel leasing company for our larger system that we wouldn't get the full benefit from. Instead of installing the largest solar panel installation on our property that would benefit both us and all Arizona customers, a much smaller system would have been installed by the leasing company that didn't give free power to APS.

There's no wonder why APS is lobbying hard to eliminate net metering – It will make them a lot of money for little or no expense out of their pocket.

Beyond the potential impacts to our household, APS's efforts to eliminate net metering will reduce or eliminate interest in homeowner solar installations, when our country should be doing more to achieve our energy independence.

Home and business owners spend their own money to install systems that provide many benefits to the grid and other ratepayers. Net-metering also allows utility customers to make their own choices about where they get their electricity, what type of electricity they want and how much they're willing to pay for it.

We still pay our monthly bills to APS. We are paying for the energy we use, and we are paying for the power grid infrastructure.

Dear Commissioner Bitter Smith,

I am a registered voter in Arizona, a stockholder in APS(PNW) and have a PV system installed on the roof of my house in Prescott, AZ that is utilizing a net metering agreement with APS. I strongly disagree with APS's proposal to revise the net metering and rooftop solar rules. If approved, these would effectively eliminate the net metering system going forward. APS's claim that this is a subsidy for a few supported by the many completely ignores the fact that APS is a monopoly with guaranteed returns on its investment, and that the approved rate structure has many subsidies and incentives required by the the State of Arizona and the AZ Corporation Commission. I view this as a blatant attempt by APS to drive the distributed solar generating business into the ground and to maintain a complete monopoly in power generation and distribution.

According to the APS website, the total connected residential rooftop generating capacity is just shy of 70mW. This is an extremely small portion of their total generating capacity, and it operates during peak load times, when generating capacity is needed the most. To say this this causes instability in APS's network beggars the imagination. APS has yet to report that generating plants are standing by, unneeded, because the net-metering supply provides all the power needed.

APS says that I use the distribution network for free; this is completely false. My bill includes charges for Account, Metering, Meter Reading, and Billing. These are charges of a plan recommended by APS and approved by the AZ Corp Commission.

h the long term, when the amount of residential/small scale solar or generated power, tied to the grid has increased, there will be a need to develop a different way of paying for the system and backup power supplied by utilities. The sort of short term methods proposed by APS is not a long term solution to a problem that has not yet arrived. It will be much better for the various utilities (APS, SRP, etc), and the AZ Corp Commission to work together to develop a long range plan

that will encourage the transition to distributed renewable power generation, and provide adequate backup generation capacity for times when the renewables are not producing power.

Until recently, APS and the State of Arizona has had a good reputation in the renewable energy market, if this change is approved, that reputation will be destroyed.

If APS's request is approved, Arizona will demonstrate to the Nation that we are not capable of taking advantage of our vast solar resources, and will drive away the sort of high tech and renewable energy investment that will provide long term, steady employment for our citizens.

As a registered voter in Arizona, I ask you to deny APS's request.

I recently travelled through southern Germany were I was pleased to find many homes and farms utilizing solar energy to a greater extent, even, that we do in Phoenix where we have far more days of sunshine per year. I feel a big reason we don't use more solar energy here is because of the control that the big utilities have in inhibiting other options. I read APS's concerns in the Arizona Republic last week, and I feel these concerns are largely exaggerated. While they my feel some losses in some areas, I believe they are compensated in others. I would expect that the commission will take an unbiased look at these issues and come to a fair solution that promotes solar energy.

My husband and I installed solar panels last year through Solar City. I believe we would not have done so if APS were charging \$50 to \$100 per month for their service. Honorable Commissioner Susan Bitter Smith;

My family moved to Arizona nearly 40 years ago and has expanded to 18 voting members of our state. After having been laid-off 3 times within 3 years in an industry that I had worked for 20 years I started a solar design company here. I have been growing this business for about 5 years and recently it has been much more difficult to stay afloat. I am the sole-provider in my household (my wife had to return to school after the industry she worked in for many years outsourced her job) and it has been rewarding but challenging to own this small business.

Largely contributing to the demise of this promising, job-creating industry is APS'es latest changes to their socalled rebates and their recent threats to weaken your net-metering requirement. From my perspective, they seem to be doing all that they can to stymie property-owner's ability to contribute to distributed generation. The image that they present to the public disguises their under-handed greediness to have it all to themselves.

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Many in-depth studies by distinguished groups (including electric companies) have proven that distributed generation in the form of homeowner's and commercial photovoltaic systems is actually financially beneficial to utility companies. Some of these benefits are:

- Deferment of Transmission and Distribution capacity upgrades (avoiding or delaying new construction)
- Reduced transformer and line losses
- Energy diversification (natural gas price hedge)
- Saved fuel expenses
- Renewable Portfolio Standard requirement compliance
- Aids disaster recovery

Of course there are also societal benefits including reduced pollution, job creation and resource diversity.

Those of us in the solar industry fully embrace the need for our industry to mature to the point of un-reliance on any incentives but we also deserve a level playing field. In my opinion, we should increase our RES requirement to be at least as aggressive as any other state and keep our current net-metering requirement in place in the meanwhile.

I have had to target other states to remain in business because unfortunately 10 of my best customer's in Arizona are on the verge of closing their doors or relocating out-of-state themselves. With all due respect, you should be cognizant of the fact that I estimate there has been at least 80 jobs lost recently between just these companies alone.

Solar energy is one of the best answers to our country's energy problems and we Arizonian's should be leading the charge rather than playing second-fiddle to other states with much less potential but with the political will to do what's morally and ethically right by their citizenry.

Solar customers supply energy harnessed from solar panel systems that we paid for. APS contributed \$0 to our solar panel system. They purchase the excess energy created by that system for far less than they charge us or any other customers for electricity. Name one business that can tell its suppliers they want to appropriate their suppliers' goods to increase their profit.

Our monthly bill includes the following charges: customer account charge, delivery service charge, environmental benefits surcharge, system benefits charge, power supply adjustment, metering, meter reading, billing, federal transmission and ancillary services, federal transmission cost adjustment and LFCR adjustor.

The LCFR adjustor was specifically approved so APS could recover fixed costs even though they are selling less electricity. This is from the APS website: "In May 2012, the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC) approved new rates for APS. Because more customers are installing renewable energy systems such as solar and wind, and energy efficiency

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measures such as compact fluorescent light bulbs and refrigerator recycling, APS is selling less electricity, but fixed costs remain. APS is allowed to implement a new charge to recover a portion of the fixed costs."

Most months, the various fees APS charges constitute more than 70% of the bill. The idea that solar customers don't play a part in contributing to APS infrastructure is absurd.

Approximately 2 years ago we installed a solar system at our home. We had a friend of the family who had begun installing systems and wanted us to apply for a grant from A.P.S. of which we did. We were approved as part of the second wave of incentives and with the amount of the grant were told by several people that we must take advantage and get it installed. We decided it <u>must</u> be the best thing for our family so we moved forward. Although we went with a different company suggested by the A.P.S Green Team.

With a company highly recommended and the system described as one of the top, we sign on for all of the great breaks that lie ahead. We did receive a incentive from A.P.S. all of which went directly to solar company , we were told also of all the savings that we would receive for years to come and also the property values that would increase, we were also promised a huge income tax break (only to find out that when you are self employed that does not apply to your burden at all!- we were not able to use a penny of that break due to self employment tax, it would of been a nice thing to know up front!) We were required to spent slightly over \$24,000. That was money that we felt we could invest because of construction contracts held and believed to be honored by the Florence Community Hospital. Our company removed all of the old existing flooring and installed all of the new flooring in the facility. Due to the end result of that company defaulting on all construction contracts, and eventually filing bankruptcy, it left our family trying to recover from a loss of over \$50,000- so pay your employees, pay for installed materials, and pay your bills and stay in business some how, some way.

So as a end result we had to go and get a loan using our travel trailer to pay for a solar system that we were sure

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was going to be the best investment for our family. Knowing for sure in just a short while we would be proud of ourselves for our choice.

We are slowly seeing a little benefit of this to good to pass up investment. As you pay a \$420. payment on a travel

trailer to see your electric bill lower by 60-70 dollars is still a hard thing to take. Most days we are positive we should

of passed it up for some one else to use that wanted to save money and the environment!

But with all that said and all the events that occurred as now a fact in our budget and life.... today we received a letter from A.P.S. informing us of how they are requesting for consumers such as our little family to be aware of changes trying to

be implemented - it seems we should be GRANDFATHERED in to a net metering system that will last 20 years and that we should not <u>significantly</u> be effected? I feel no comfort in that phrase!! To me that means that yes you will pay more we just need to get the approval!

First off we pay each month a huge amount of fees on our bill- 90% of which no consumer even knows what they are

for and who it is that receives those nickles, dimes, quarters and mostly dollars. They are just considered feesand you pay them regardless. Those seem to have nothing to do with how much power we use, just the fact that we must use this company. All of our power does not come from solar just a portion, and yes we still help pay for that grid of this I am positive, I guess we just need to pay more!

I have a huge issue with this. They are a power company that was fully aware that "going green" as in their "Green Team", was going to in the end cost them money on the bottom line, unfortunately you can not collect usage dollars for the sun, although in the beginning I suppose that the federal dollars that was given to begin such a earth saving program was worth collecting and the image of their company being

so environmentally friendly made for great advertising to recruit consumers who were naive enough to buy into it and just believe. Hoping to save money for their family.

How is it fair to always get everything? How do you get the chance to be a great save the world company, collect at go, collect in the middle and then sing the blues only to collect in the end? Even more strange is the fact that they are only changing the consumers accounts not the commercial accounts. Who matters more I have to wonder?

How can you not be responsible for brown outs because you are over burdened? I want to express my concerns about the latest maneuvering that APS is doing to cut solar power off at the knees. It seems every time the solar industry starts to grow someone wants to stop it. Arizona is the prefect place for the generation of solar power so why don't we embrace it?

We have a full array of solar panels (42) on our house. We are retired and were tired of APS continually raising its rates and/or surcharges. We were trying to find a way to cut our monthly living expenses. Now they are crying they are not making enough money. Shouldn't the cost of keeping up their lines be part of doing business? We don't have a choice in the utility company we buy electricity from. It does say on our bill we could get it from someone else but I don't know who that would be, as SRP has never been given as a choice. Isn't APS making enough money to pay their bills and make a reasonable profit? They just added the LFCR (Lost Fixed Cost Recovery) adjustor to our bills.

Thanks to the response of Arizona Citizens, APS does not face a huge Federal fine. Doesn't that count as money saved? Of course, if they were fined they would just pass it off to their customers. We are trying to do our part in conserving fossil fuels and cutting environmental damage to our planet and the atmosphere. If APS manages to persuade the commission to pass this new proposal how many jobs newly created in the solar industry will be lost? What happens to the value solar panels added to our homes? It won't be worth it for new buyers (who would be considered new customers) to pay added value when they would not see it reflected in their utility bills. Again we are seeing that the individual counts for nothing and huge corporations have all the control.

I don't understand how APS can say we are getting to much credit for our solar power. Most of the time we only use electricity from APS at night after the solar has shut down. When I was on the 9 to 9 Time Advantage plan I only paid 7 cents per kilowatt hour from 9PM to 9AM, all weekends and holidays. Now I am using the extra power I generate at 16-18 cents a kilowatt hour to cover my use at night. At the end of the year the extra kilowatts I sell back to APS costs them 6 cents a kilowatt hour which they have already sold to other customers at a higher rate. According to APS the wholesale

price I receive is the same they would have to pay another utility if they had to buy the extra power so I would call that a trade off, unless they are buying the extra power from another utility that is owned by their same corporation so then the corporation feels they are losing money. I would also like to know how the commercial buyers are paying fairly but the residential buyers are not. How does that make sense? I would suggest that commercial buyers have more power to persuade then residential buyers so APS did not want to antagonize them by including them in this proposal.

In closing, I urge the commissioners to consider the cost to future generations if solar energy is again shot down just as it is making its presents known. Competition is what America thrives on and competition drives prices down not up.

Executive Summary:

The current APS Campaign on Solar Regulations is incredibly dishonest.

It is designed to restrict or eliminate competition – allowing them to raise rates.

Monopolies do not bring lower rates.

The recent mailing by 60 Plus, and their TV spots have a core of dishonesty.

I'm a senior, and I have solar panels on my roof. Since when does limiting or eliminating competition bring lower prices? The 60 Plus statement about \$3 in energy getting \$16 in credit is less than honest. Last year I had 2,399 Kwh left in my account, and APS bought them for \$137.54. That comes out to .0573 per Kwh. My Next door neighbor who does NOT have solar is on a split plan, but PAID .0605 <u>average</u> for her energy. Their statement that MY system cost others \$20,000 is ludicrous. My non-solar neighbor paid \$18 in Transmission Fees last month. I generated excess electricity which didn't have to be transmitted over large distances. Since

my Air Conditioning doesn't run continuously 24/7 – I'm still feeding their grid power that they can sell during peak summer hours.

APS has consistently gamed the system to raise their prices. Their current pattern is to ask the corporation commission for 2 or 3 times what they want, and "settle" for half. When they can't get the price hike they want, they get permission to add on various surcharges – rather than just charge an honest rate.

Our bills include:

Customer Account Charge, Delivery service charge, System Benefits charge, Power supply adjustment, Metering Charge, Meter reading charge, Billing Charge, Federal transmission and ancillary services charge, Federal transmission cost adjustment charge, Franchise fee, and regulatory assessment charge.

All of these were added – one or two a year – when they couldn't get what they wanted from the Corporation Commission.

15 or so years back they were unhappy with the profit they were allowed by law to make, so they formed a "Holding Company", and sold themselves to it. Now They were allowed to make an additional profit at the holding company. The other Power Company – SRP, Salt River Project – routinely charges approx 10% less than APS rates. And in small territory overlap areas where SRP has the right to do business – but due to equipment locations and limitations – APS provides the service – SRP is required to reimburse the customers for the difference in rates they have to pay APS.

APS has promised to "Grandfather" current Solar Panel owners for 20 years in an attempt to buy our silence. We know APS well enough to know that they will find some way to tack on additional charges to us – as soon as this current controversy is settled. We live in Arizona – we know not to turn our back on a snake. APS just brought 2 solar generation plants on line. They love solar – as long as <u>they</u> are getting paid for it.

Please do not allow APS to re-establish an expensive monopoly in Phoenix.

Dear Corporation Commissioner,

I am an APS customer who recently had a solar system installed. I vehemently object to APS's portrayal of people like myself as leeches who receive an unfair return from APS for the excess power we pump into the grid. Currently we are credited the exact same amount that APS normally charges for each KwHr. As I'm sure you know, APS sells "green electricity" to willing customers for more than their usual price; so one could make the logical argument that my solar credit should be worth that same higher rate.

APS recently told us that people like me that already have solar installed will continue to receive the present credit for our excess power. That doesn't make what APS is proposing any more proper or fair.

Net metering makes sense. If I have to buy electricity from APS at a certain rate, APS should be willing to pay me that same rate when my solar panels provide electricity to the grid. After all, APS just turns around and sells the power I produce to my neighbors. I appreciate the fact that APS has provided and will be maintaining the infrastructure required to allow me to provide power to and draw power from the grid. I believe ALL APS customers should pay a monthly fee to support the infrastructure which is required regardless of the the power usage. As I stated in my prior e-mail, people with vacation homes need the infrastructure to be available when they need it, but their yearly consumption is likely not sufficient to cover the basic infrastructure costs. Many

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low-usage consumers may be in the same situation. A basic infrastructure fee for all consumers makes sense. Solar customers should not be treated any differently than other low-usage customers!!

APS is trying to make the case that Arizona should change its successful net metering program. I am concerned that changing net metering would stop my friends and neighbors from going solar. That would be bad for Arizona and the nation. We've got so much sunshine; we'd be fools not to harness it. My solar system has no parts made in China and I would hope that the USA can become a solar powerhouse.

Please STOP APS's assault on customers who are trying to save energy.

I do NOT agree with APS proposal to cut NetMetering system in place. The APS proposal amounts to killing job creation and job diversification in Arizona. These are two things we really need in this State. The other key factor is they are reneging on promises made to solar owners. We have abundant sunshine and we should not be taxing individuals to use it! I've heard the Governor applaud our adoption of solar and that we should be the Solar State of America. This does not support that goal.

They did not follow the spirit of ACC's decree to investigate NetMetering. While they hosted the meetings, answered a few questions, they did not internalize the damage to Arizonians and our fragile economy. As it is right now, many renewable energy companies (beyond just PV companies) are avoiding Arizona. We are telling everyone: Arizona is not friendly to new business development!

Top issues:

1) They are being deceptive on their mathematics and claims. To use their terms (APS chart below), customer generation does NOT need grid support. In many cases, a solar system generates and the house simultaneously uses that energy (labeled below: Energy Efficient Appliance). This is basically an expensive Energy Efficient appliance. Much like adding energy efficient light bulbs, washing machines, windows etc... APS does not ask customers to reimbursement them for using less power. Although some of them think they should raise "fixed costs" to compensate! Come on ... this is ridiculous.



- 2) IF you look at APS's chart, it is clear that only a small percentage of energy is actually exported. They make it sound like every solar system is massively exporting energy.
 - a. As a point of clarification: In the existing rate structure, APS pays out any annual exports at a fraction of the NetMetering rates. It is approximately \$0.07/kWhr.
 ACTION: APS should provide a year by year calculation of exactly how much money was paid for annual Solar over production (\$ and % of total residential production).
 - b. By the way, I actually support this annual payout calculation, as it is fair for everyone. APS gets to sell power at existing "On peak" rates and it only costs them ~\$0.07/kWhr. If they sell it at \$0.24/kWhr, then their gross margin is 70.8%. This is a very reasonable rate of return. This also incentivizes home owners to size their system correctly. If it is too big, and you are exporting at the end of the year, then you should not reap the same benefits as NetMetering.
 - I think we all forget that home owned solar systems in Arizona still cost a lot of money! The breakeven under today's plan is still ~8-12 years (which factors in the ITC and AZ tax credit).
- 3) It bothers me to even discuss grandfather clauses as it seems to justify their proposal. Again, I do not support their position. Grandfather clause should include:
 - a. Support for the life of the system (systems are designed to last 25-30 years and it will cost money to replace some components, for instance, Inverters).
 - b. The rates plans, such as 9am-9pm Time of day plan, should be rolled over to new homeowner. This was a key part of the return on investment when I bought my system. They should not be able to cry foul now!

Again, this is bad for driving business in our State. If this is approved, AZ will be viewed as incompetent to the rest of the country , as we will not be able to reap benefit from our natural resources (the Sun). That would have been like Texas blocking oil development!

Remember, the President of the United States of America has stated we all need to do more to create a sustainable renewable environment. The world is watching our great nation to see if we really do walk the talk. Don't let this happen under your watch.

Please dismiss their proposal with prejudice. Make a public statement that at the surface this does not look like a viable plan, but that APS will be given their day to present to ACC. I would like to attend that session.

"I am writing to express my opposition to the APS proposal presently before the Corporation Commission. In essence, APS wishes to curtail the solar industry by charging a very large monthly surcharge to customers who install solar and tie into the grid. They wish to eliminate the EPR-6 program and change the net metering from on-par to a wholesale/retail program.

As to the monthly surcharge (estimated at \$50-\$100); how does the utility in any way justify such an expense. There are pre-solar installations that have total bills less than \$100.00 per month at certain times of the year. As an example, can we imagine a pre-solar bill of \$75.00 for November that now becomes \$100.00 just because they added solar and used no electricity from APS?

Regarding the EPR-6 program. It was the Corporation Commission that made APS offer this program as an alternative to EPR-2 in the first place. Does the disparity issue no longer exist? It was considered unfair back then and now it does not? As a business APS does purchase electricity at wholesale and sell at retail. This makes sense but is not a fair comparison relating to the residential consumer. We are dealing here with homeowners who wish to look at an environmental alternative to conventional electrical generation and are thereby just using less. Homeowners should not be penalized just for doing the right thing.

Additionally, APS proposes increasing the incentive program which they have annually lowered to the point it hardly exists. Since the funds for the incentive program come directly from the surcharge on the consumer's utility bill (and not from APS corporately), this is nothing more than a smoke screen to try and appease the critics of their proposal and is not really part of the issue at hand.

The Corporation Commission is mandated with <u>PROTECTING</u> the consumer from monopolies. If this is not the foremost consideration then we need to look closely at who we have representing that fact within the Commission. APS states that they need this additional income to provide a grid for the consumers to use and downplay the benefits that rooftop solar plays in reduced transmission lines. This tax (and that is exactly what it is) is unwarranted and unfair. APS would like us to think they are a solar advocate but nothing could be farther from the truth. I live in Sedona, AZ, Yavapai County, and I am the owner of residential rooftop solar system. <u>I am writing this email to plead with you not to allow APS to stop the net metering of</u> <u>electricity for rooftop solar systems</u> as it will completely destroy the residential and small business solar industry causing a loss of jobs and causing us to continue to rely upon huge, centralized, pollution producing and land devouring (large scale solar) power plants.

I realize that in their request to stop net metering they are stating that we will be grandfathered in for 20 years, unless of course we sell the house or make any other changes to our systems. I, and others, were willing to make a capital investment because we believe in renewable power sources and wanted to be part of helping create jobs for Americans.

If you take away net metering then there will be absolutely no reason and no incentive to invest in rooftop solar, which is by far the most efficient and least disruptive of all solar

systems. No new infrastructure has to be built, you do not have to use up enormous acreage as the large solar plants do, you don't have any cost of maintenance added to the bills of the electrical customers because the owners take care of the maintenance on their systems.

It appears that APS wants to get rid of net metering on any new rooftop solar systems and pay us like we were a wholesale power producer. Their reasoning is that we who have these systems don't pay to help maintain the grid and I put to you that this is very weak argument at best and a complete fabrication at worst.

For those of us who were willing to make the expenditure and over produce, APS makes an enormous profit from our power. My system currently produces more electricity than I use so at the end of the year I sell back to APS the excessive electricity. They pay me .06/kW. I do not receive a check that I can spend but only a number in my account that is then reduced each month by an average of \$10 that I am charged for meter reading and billing. Each year the credit increases because I will continue to produce more electricity than I use. This credit costs APS nothing since it is just a number in an account. However, APS sells my electricity as green power at .24/Kw for 400% of pure profit. With the way the grid is currently set up they can sell our green power all over the country, especially to those areas where there are not many sunny days. So I doubt they have any problem selling our green power and receiving the 400% profit

If you allow them to remove net metering and go to a system of paying rooftop system owners as wholesale power suppliers it will completely shut down the rooftop solar industry. APS has already put a huge burden on the small commercial systems by adding a monthly fee that makes any new systems completely non-viable economically. The monthly fee negates any savings in electrical costs and extends the ROI out to 15-20 years or more. No small business is going to spend that kind of capital for no return.

APS saves an enormous amount of capital because our rooftop systems have their highest production during the highest demand of the day, especially in the summer months. We produce a very large supply of power during these times of high demand. This has allowed APS to forestall or cancel altogether any added production capacity they would need to meet this demand. The federal government, the local governments, and your commission have begged the homeowner to make the investment and go solar and many of us have done so. **Now suddenly the rules of the game are going to be changed???**

I urge you to restore and extend robust incentives to all interested residential and commercial investors. Arizona has the best solar resource in the country. Let's keep Arizona's solar economy going strong!!

Honorable Commissioner Bitter-Smith,

I live in Cottonwood, AZ, Yavapai county, and I am the owner of both a 5.8 kW residential rooftop solar system and a 10.4kW small business system. *I am writing this email to plead with you not to allow APS to stop the net metering of electricity for rooftop solar systems as it will completely destroy the residential and small business solar industry causing a loss of jobs and causing us to continue to rely upon huge, centralized, pollution producing and land devouring (large scale solar) power plants.*

I realize that in their request to stop net metering they are stating that we will be grandfathered in for 20 years, unless of course we sell the house or make any other changes to our systems. Then we will fall under the new rules. I am writing on behalf of future systems I had planned to install and for those citizens who are currently contemplating a system. If the net metering is taken away I can guarantee that I will be unable to build any future systems due to the prohibitive cost and lack of benefit.

With the rebate at \$1.90/w (now in the \$.20 range) and the federal and state tax credits my home system still cost me \$12,000 plus I had to sign a contract that I would operate the system at its maximum for 20 years and if I sell my house I have to contractually bind the new owner to operate it for the remainder of the 20 years. My annual bill for electricity is less than \$1000 per year. With these figures you can see that even with net metering and a zero electric bill, which few people actually accomplish, it will take over 13 years to get back my capital investment. There is no company that I

know of that would make a capital investment with that length of ROI. Most companies will only accept a maximum of 5 years and even that is a stretch. I and others were willing to make this capital investment because we believe in renewable power sources and wanted to be part of helping create jobs for Americans.

If you take away net metering then there will be absolutely no reason and no incentive to invest in rooftop solar, which is by far the most efficient and least disruptive of all solar systems. No new infrastructure has to be built, you do not have to use up enormous acreage as the large solar plants do, you don't have any cost of maintenance added to the bills of the electrical customers because the owners take care of the maintenance on their systems. I do not know of a more beneficial way to produce more power, particularly during peak consumption, that has no impact on the environment, requires no infrastructure changes and does not consume one square inch of land. The benefits to home solar are enormous with virtually no downside and that is a very difficult outcome to achieve in any form of power production.

It appears that APS wants to get rid of net metering on any new rooftop solar systems and pay us like we were a wholesale power producer. Their reasoning is that we who have these systems don't pay to help maintain the grid and I put to you that this is very weak argument at best and a complete fabrication at worst.

First, most homeowners do not have systems large enough, due to cost, to eradicate their entire bill so they still get charged by APS for electricity from the grid and therefore also pay for maintaining the grid.

Second, for those of us who were willing to make the expenditure and over produce, APS makes an enormous profit from our power. My system currently produces double my annual usage so at the end of the year I sell back to APS approximately 4000Kw of green electricity. They pay me .06/kW which comes to \$240 that gets credited to my account. I do not receive a check that I can spend but only a number in my account that is then reduced each month by an average of \$10 that I am charged for meter reading and billing. This \$240 is useless to me as each year the credit increases by an average of \$120/year. This credit costs APS nothing since it is just a number in an account.

Yet they can take the fund of money, if they even actually have a fund, and invest it and receive the benefit of interest, dividends and capital gains while I get nothing.

APS then sells my electricity as green power at .24/Kw at a 400% profit without having any capital expenditures, no maintenance costs, no environmental studies, or any other generation costs, it is pure profit. With the way the grid is currently set up they can sell our green power all over the country, especially to those areas where there are not many sunny days. So I doubt they have any problem selling our green power and receiving the 400% profit.

They continually state that they have spent billions of dollars on incentives to make Arizona one of the leading solar producing states which is a total fabrication. The money that is given out as incentives is the money that was collected from all the customers of APS as the environmental surcharge on our bills. To my knowledge not one penny of APS' profit is used to fund the alternative energy incentives, they simply manage the fund. So again, they receive a huge benefit in receiving green power without having to put a single dollar in capital outlay to generate the power nor do they pay a single dollar to maintain the generation system. *That alone will more than cover my costs for using the grid.* So their claim that they are going to have to raise the rates on others in order to maintain the grid is absolutely false.

I would very much like to see a study done of the amount of credit money sitting in accounts that the customer cannot access and the amount of excess solar generation APS sells each month. These figures should be readily available from APS.

If you allow them to remove net metering and go to a system of paying rooftop system owners as wholesale power suppliers it will completely shut down the rooftop solar industry. From my perspective it appears to that APS is bent on shutting down all of the small rooftop solar systems. They have already put a huge burden on the small commercial systems by adding a monthly fee that makes any new systems completely non-viable economically. The monthly fee negates any savings in electrical costs and extends the ROI out to 15-20 years or more. No small business is going to spend that kind of capital for no return.

It also seems that APS is purposefully attempting to shut down any new small systems in favor of huge, acreage eating, systems that they own and therefore control and get all the profit. If this is true I have a question as to who pays for the grid maintenance when APS builds their own solar plants? APS does out of the profits received from the power.

APS saves an enormous amount of capital because our rooftop systems have their highest production during the highest demand of the day, especially in the summer months. We produce a very large supply of power during these times of high demand which has allowed APS to forestall or cancel altogether any added production capacity they would need to meet this demand. The generation costs to meet this specific demand are much higher due to the fact that you have to start up generation extra generation capacity for the high demand period and then shut it down as the demand drops off during the day. Therefore your generation equipment is idle most of the day and producing no income and why they created the time of use billing systems.

The federal government, the local governments, and your commission have begged the homeowner to make the investment and go solar and many of us have done so. Now suddenly the rules of the game are going to be changed so APS can make a higher profit yet at the same time their request will shut down the rooftop solar systems. I imagine this will leave a lot more incentive money for large commercial systems, many of which APS will own outright or perhaps through corporations they own or own a majority interest in so they can be eligible for the incentives.
