## Reed joins group to keep Bills in Buffalo

**BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)** — Andre Reed is leading his Hall of Fame pedigree to a fan group trying to keep the Bills in Buffalo.

The former Bills star receiver was one of 14 members named to the Buffalo Fan Alliance advisory board Monday. The alliance was formed two years ago and is made up of local business leaders offering to raise funds to help the franchise's next owner offset costs.

"I'm going to use that platform any way I can to gain more speed for this alliance to keep the team here," said Reed, who will be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August. "For a guy like Ralph Wilson, who made my life so good, it's kind of an obligation for me to give back to what Ralph started here in Buffalo."

Reed was referring to the Bills owner and founder, whose death last month left the franchise's future uncertain.

The Bills, valued at \$170 million, will be put up for sale, raising the possibility of the team relocating. Toronto and Los Angeles are regarded as potential suitors.

Among those joining Reed on the advisory board are former Bills kicker Steve Christie, former New York Giants receiver Phil McConkey, who is from Buffalo, and NBC correspondent Luke Ruserst, who's late father Tim was from Buffalo and was a major Bills backer.

Reed referred to the Bills as part of the fabric of western New York, and integral to the region's identity and Wilson's legacy.

"He could have moved that team any time he wanted to, but his allegiance to

the city was very, very strong," Reed said. "There isn't a scenario that I can imagine that would not include the Bills franchise in Buffalo."

The alliance's objective is raising up to \$170 million, which would be made available as an interest-free loan. It's estimated that the savings from the loan would be as much as \$14 million annually.

The alliance is registered as a nonprofit group, and would not be involved directly in an ownership group because NFL guidelines bar community ownership of teams except for the Green Bay Packers. The alliance has also retained a law firm with NFL connections to ensure the loan would meet the league's business guidelines and not trigger public disclosure requirements or require approval from the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Alliance spokesman Matt Sabuda said the group hopes to begin raising money this summer.

"One thing want to emphasize is it's not a silver bullet, not a be-all, end-all," he said. "But it can make a significant difference in making the Bills viable by tapping into the ex-pat Bills fan-base around the country."

New York City real estate mogul Donald Trump, Hall of Fame quarterback Jim Kelly, the family of Boston Bruins owner Jeremy Jacobs and New Jersey rocker Jon Bon Jovi are among those with ties to prospective ownership groups.

The Bills are essentially locked into playing at Ralph Wilson Stadium through the 2019 season because of the lease they negotiated with the state and county in December 2012.

Gov Jan Brewer has more than 75 bills on her desk as the Legislature pushes to end the session this week. In addition to two gun measures (story, Page A1), she must decide on five other bills by today:

» House Bill 2003 makes changes to statutes related to operating a motorized boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs, including making it a civil penalty with a fine to refuse to submit to an alcohol test.

» HB 2281 would exempt property

» HB 2336 would allow a law-enforcement officer to be prohibited from carrying a weapon while drinking at any licensed liquor establishment.

» Senate Bill 1211 would allow state employees and ranchers to kill a wolf if it was caught in the act of killing or wounding livestock.

» SB 1242 would require the state Board of Education to create a critical language and economic-development pilot program if sufficient money was provided.

## Budget hearing online tonight

Phoenix will host its last hearing on City Manager Ed Zuercher's trial budget at 6 tonight, and residents wanting to participate can do so from the comfort of their home.

For the third year in a row, the city manager and Mayor Greg Stanton will host an interactive online budget forum. The hearing will be broadcast live on the Internet at phoenix.gov and PHX 11, the city's cable-TV station.

Phoenix has hosted about 20 hear-

ings on Zuercher's trial budget, which proposes about \$29 million in cuts to help close a \$37.7 million deficit in the upcoming fiscal year.

The trial budget is the starting point for budget negotiations, and Zuercher and City Council members will use input from the hearings to help craft a final spending plan. Zuercher will present his revised proposal May 6. Council members are expected to approve a final budget by late next month.

### AT THE CAPITOL

#### MERIT BADGE ADDRESSING DISABILITIES

A rare vote to pass a Democratic bill got unanimous support in both the Senate and the House. House Bill 2667, sponsored by Rep. Stefanie Mach, D-Tucson, removes the words "disabled" and "handicapped" from dozens of state statutes. Statutes would instead say a person "with a disability" or "who has a disability."

Mach survived a car accident in 1997 in which she suffered serious burn injuries and the loss of an arm. "The current language is offensive," she said. "My bill changes the archaic words in our statutes and replaces them with 'person or persons with disabilities.' These are the terms that most people with disabilities prefer."

Brewer now has five days to sign the bill, veto it or do nothing and allow it to become law.

#### WATERCOOLER PUBLIC-RECORDS BILL

A strike-everything amendment to House Bill 2414, which aimed to provide a defense for government agencies to deny public-records requests they decide are "unduly burdensome or harassing," appears to be dead. The Senate voted it down 17-6, with bipartisan opposition.

#### THE SAUSAGE CHILD-WELFARE REVIEW

The Legislature has given final approval to Senate Bill 1386, which allocates \$250,000 to hire an outside expert to conduct a review of the state's child-welfare system. The expert would have to submit a report by March 2015. Brewer now has five days to sign the bill, veto it or do nothing and allow it to become law.

Pierce provided The Daily Times Martin's phone number but, when called, a man answered who said that his name but he would not confirm he is the owner. However, the man said business owners should have access to adequate records on the backgrounds of potential employees.

Carter was in jail in 2004 and later bonded out, according to detention center documents. The documents do not identify who posted his bond, but Pierce said it was Martin.

In 2005, after he was booked on additional charges, the detention center released him to the New Mexico State Department of Corrections, according to detention center documents. "Watch your kids," Pierce said, "because if he gets bailed out he's coming back

to work."

The affidavit describes Carter's advances, sometimes in lurid detail. Carter bought Pierce's daughter and another underage girl who was her friend cell phones, candy, pajamas and a teddy bear. He also bought the young girls a big bunny and a telescope and made them whistles.

On car rides around Farmington lake, to the Bloomfield Dam and to his home to let his dogs out, he would separate the thighs of the girls sitting on his lap, pulling them closer as they steered and he pressed the pedals. One of the girls told police that every time she drove with Carter she felt his "bone" push against her behind.

Other times he would photograph underage girls in his home wearing bikinis, telling them he needed the photos to sketch them later.

One of the girls told Bloomfield police about recommendations.

Styron said he hasn't seen the results from the surveys but he wants to make sure the department didn't miss any areas of concern. He said the meeting will provide another chance for input.

Carter touching her "cha cha," saying she was scared to speak because he was often at their home until midnight pretending to fix their floor.

The girl told police that Carter told her anything he did to her in his truck "is nothing she needs to tell anyone about."

Upon prompting, other underage girls told Bloomfield police that Carter groped their vaginas.

Bloomfield Police Chief Mike Kovacs said he's glad Carter has been caught, but added that the state doesn't have sufficient laws regulating registered sex offenders.

Begay said is that the reservation land has been "destroyed" because animals roam free.

This damage is causing dust and sand to fly during high winds, that is causing asthma and other respiratory problems, he said.

"There are sand dunes forming all over," Delegate Leonard Tsoie said.

Shelly said he agrees that the Navajo people need to share their opinions about the proposed act but, despite the opposition, it is a solution.

Shelly continued the State of the Nation by highlighting the \$1 billion in funding the tribe will receive from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to address clean up of abandoned uranium mines located throughout the reservation.

Although there are many abandoned uranium mines on the reservation, and the money will provide for the clean up of only 40, it is a start, he said.

The president also said he understands the need

for additional scholarship money for Navajo students.

In fiscal year 2014, the Office of Navajo Nation Scholarship and Financial Assistance awarded scholarships to 4,792 students but 6,260 students were declined assistance because of a lack of funds.

Shelly said the Navajo Nation Washington Office is monitoring the progress of the Native Language Immersion Student Achievement Act in the U.S. Senate which would promote the academic achievement of the Navajo people need to share their opinions about the proposed act but, despite the opposition, it is a solution.

He highlighted the progress being made under the Navajo Nation General Leasing Act of 2013, which streamlines the process to obtain residential and business site leasing on the reservation and without the approval of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Another accomplishment he mentioned was securing money to complete the expansion of U.S. Highway 491 from a two-lane to a four-lane highway.

Shelly noted that the De-

partment of Navajo Veterans Affairs has started construction of 75 new homes in the five agencies with the goal to build 300 homes in the next four years.

"We will fund the money to ensure these homes are properly equipped with appliances and heating," Shelly said.

"There should be no shortcut when it comes to housing our veterans."

The president also took time to reflect on the situation the tribal government was in five years ago.

At that time, he said, there was turmoil because of the push to reduce the council from 88 to 24 members and the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch exchanged heated press releases but despite that, the government continued to operate.

"It's important for us to remember that it is OK to disagree and have opposing opinions on matters," he said.

"What we must practice is being respectful of different views."





the meaning of #BostonStrong," Obama wrote.

The race was held under extraordinary security, including 100 new surveillance cameras, more than 90 bomb-sniffing dogs and officers posted on roofs.

As runners continued to drag themselves across the finish line in the late afternoon, more than six hours into the race, state emergency officials reported no security threats other than some unattended bags.

Kenya's Rita Jeptoo won the women's race in a course-record 2 hours, 18 minutes, 57 seconds, defending the title she won last year but could not celebrate because of the tragedy.

Keflezighi, who did not run last year because of an injury, won the main event this year in 2:08:37. A 38-year-old U.S. citizen who emigrated from Eritrea as a boy, Keflezighi wrote the names of the three dead on his bib along with that of the MIT police officer killed during the manhunt.

As he was presented with the trophy and golden laurel wreath, "The Star-Spangled Banner" echoed over Boylston Street, where the explosions rang out a year ago.

"I came as a refugee,

and the United States gave me hope," said Keflezighi, who was welcomed by fans chanting "U.S.A.!" "This is probably the most meaningful victory for an American, because of what happened last year."

At 2:49 p.m., the time of the first explosion, the crowd at the finish line observed a moment of silence – then broke into some of the loudest cheers of the day, with whooping, clapping and the clanging of cowbells.

This year's starting field of 32,408 included 600 people who were given special invitations for those who were "profoundly impacted" by the attacks, and almost 5,000 runners who were stopped on the course last year when the bombs went off.

"Today, when I got to that point, I said, 'I have to do some unfinished business,'" said runner Vicki Schmidt, 52, of Nashville. She added: "You can't hold us back. You can't get us down. Boston is magical. This is our place."

Some of the victims themselves returned for a ceremonial crossing of the finish line.

"It was hard. It was really hard," said Heather Abbott, who wore a "Boston Strong" sticker on the black prosthesis where

her left leg used to be. "I was really nervous. I didn't want to fall. I'm just glad we made it."

Tatyana McFadden, who was 6 and sickly when she was adopted out of a Russian orphanage by an American, won the women's wheelchair race for the second straight year. Afterward, she spoke of Martin Richard, the 8-year-old boy who was the youngest of those killed in the explosions.

"I have a Russian heritage, but I am an American," McFadden said. "For today, not only was I running for Martin and his family, but all those other people that were affected by last year."

Dzhokhar Tsarnaev 20, is awaiting trial in the attack and could get the death penalty. Prosecutors said he and his older brother – ethnic Chechens who came to the U.S. from Russia more than a decade ago – carried out the attack in retaliation for U.S. wars in Muslim lands.

Tamerlan Tsarnaev 26, died in a shootout with police days after the bombings.

"It was a hard last year," Lee Ann Yanr whose left leg was badly hurt in the bombing, said moments after crossing the finish line. "And we're just so much better at stronger."






