Dear Commissioners,

We appreciate your recent decision to allow "opting out" of "smart" meters in Arizona, (which unfortunately does nothing for those who are unaware of their true dangers). However, we see it as unjust and illegal to discriminate against solar customers in regard to our second meters. People who have purchased solar did not "sign up" for having a potent wireless broadcasting/relay device on our private homes where we seek restorative respite from microwave proliferation. (Microwaves are the proper term for this health hazard, termed "microwave sickness" by the military decades ago.)

We growing numbers of solar customers are typically caring, responsible, informed people who want to do the right thing by future generations. We try to be part of the solution and not part of the problem. But if we are forced to become "part of the problem" to endanger ourselves, our neighbors and nature with yet more wireless radiation, as other citizens and experts are trying arduously to bring to your awareness, then many considering solar will decide against it.

We appeal to your conscience as people with children and grandchildren. Do you really wish to discourage solar? According to energy experts, we are already way behind schedule in adopting renewable energies in time to forestall the looming and inevitable problems of fossil fuel depletion, for which future generations will pay a very high price and wonder why we failed to act rightly.

APS has expressed concern about the grid getting overpowered at peak sunshine times as the solar grid builds. If an interactive, communicative grid is important for that reason, then why not seek a win-win solution? Why not find a way to wire it in, as some cities have done? Extra telephone wires, for example, could possibly be employed, or perhaps fiber optic cable already in place.

If we solar customers are not allowed to opt out on our solar meter, we are worried for our personal health; we have both tracked neurological and cardio health symptoms in conjunction with wifi and cell phones and avoid those as much as possible. We are also worried that our home and solar investment will lose economic value as people recognize the dangers of these meters. Accordingly, we would gladly join any collective efforts to mount legal action to redress any such problems.

Hopefully, this will not be necessary. Hopefully the Commission will find a way to satisfy all parties involved. It is not an easy task, but we urge you to stay with it until a solution is found that meets the concerns of all involved, including the elephant in the room that has no voice to represent it: the natural world and the DNA and biology of all species including humans, born and unborn.
