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

In addition, UNSE is proposing: to include in its base rates \$4.3 million in transmission costs currently recovered through a Transmission Cost Adjustor; a one-year credit to the purchased power and fuel adjustment clause ("PPFAC") to reflect the deferred savings related to the acquisition of the Gila River Power Plant Unit 3; modifications to its rate design, its PPFAC, Lost Fixed Cost Recovery mechanism, and Net Metering Tariff for new net metered customers submitting applications for interconnection after June 1, 2015; updated depreciation rates; and modifications to its Tariffs and Rules and Regulations. Under the rates as proposed by the Company, an average residential customer using 983 kWh in summer and 669 kWh in winter would see a monthly increase of \$1.99, from \$87.83 to \$89.82 in the first year, and an additional increase of \$7.87, to \$97.69, in subsequent years. A customer's bill depends on monthly energy consumption. A customer using less or more than the average would experience a smaller or larger increase.



Listless D-backs tripped by Astros

HOUSTON (AP) – Arizona Diamondbacks manager Chip Hale made it clear after Sunday's 4-1 loss to the Houston Astros that he wasn't happy with his team's energy level.

Collin McHugh threw seven solid innings, and Carlos Gomez delivered a two-run, go-ahead single to lead Houston.

"We just didn't do a good job," Hale said. "It's the way it goes. Sunday day game. Energy level wasn't great compared to the way we've been playing on this road trip. We'll have to get to the bottom of it and crank it back up for Washington. I was surprised we weren't more competitive today."

The streaky Diamondbacks entered the weekend as winners of six straight and eight of 11 following a six-game losing streak around the All-Star break. But after dropping a second consecutive game to Houston and losing the series, Hale pointed to the intensity.

On Saturday night, Hale benched Yasmany Tomas for a similar hustle-related issue after Tomas didn't sprint out a grounder to first base.

First baseman Jake Lamb said he was unaware of a lack of energy in the game.

"Not that I can tell," Lamb said. "I can't speak on that. In the dugout, it's the same it's always been. Guys are still busting their butts and everything."



Carolyn Cardinez of Hawaii, whose son plays on the team and whose husband is one of the coaches, said people warned her about the Arizona heat. But she was surprised by how much the Nogales weather is similar to the islands, with the exception of the lightning.

"We have them, but it's not like the bolts. I mean, we'll have them once in a while, but other than that it's just the flashes here and there," Cardinez said of the July 28 storm. "But the bolts were like, 'Oh my gosh, that was a little close!' It's pretty neat driving down and watching it all."

Murphy said the Washington team wasn't able to do a lot of exploring or going out during their time off. The adults struggled to keep the boys ready to play and there was such a small window of time to really do any-

thing, he added.

As a result, they weren't able to do much more than going to the movies. Washington manager Jeff Lockhart said he felt blessed to have had the opportunity to come here, play against competitive teams and enjoy the community and sense of family — the sense of Nogales pride.

"My son got to meet a great kid out here, Jesus Miranda, and spend a lot of time with him and, to me, that's what this is all about — life experiences," he said. "It's great to play in the tournament, great to play baseball, great to be in this position when we didn't think we would."

Snake hunting

Cardinez also said the Hawaiian team enjoyed their time in the border town and spent time at the Morley Avenue shopping district.

"It's hard when they try to speak to you in Spanish and I'm like 'I don't know' and they try to

explain," she said. "I think that's the hardest thing, but it's been fun trying to guess what they're trying to say."

The Hawaiians were shocked — in a good way — by the prices of food and other items compared to the island, where milk is almost \$9, a loaf of bread is \$5 and eggs are \$9, Cardinez said.

"I think I bought like seven backpacks for like \$35. Back home it would probably be one, luckily, for \$35," Cardinez, who works for the State of Hawaii Department of Education, said. "We're loving the prices here. It's been fun, we're enjoying ourselves."

The islanders also took advantage of excursions that aren't available in their home state. Cardinez said it was the first time one of the players was able to leave the islands, and only the second time out for one of the coaches.

"This is different for our boys," the mother of two said. "We went

snake hunting, we found tarantulas, we found scorpions. We don't get to see that kind of stuff back in Hawaii. It's been real fun and people here are just really friendly and it's been good."

Hawaii manager Justin Malina took the team to a Diamondbacks game in Phoenix on a day off, where the team had to endure 116-degree weather,

he said. "We had a good chance to go watch the Diamondbacks play, we drove up to Phoenix, had a day off, so we watched it, enjoyed the city. Tomorrow, if anything, if we have time, we're going to walk through the border areas," Malina said of Thursday, July 23, their free day after the tournament.

Although Hawaii won

the West, Malina said it didn't matter: win or lose, the games were lovely. He said he couldn't expect anything better from the tournament, the people and those who ran the events.

"Thank you very much to Nogales, and the people of Nogales," he said. "You've been very humble and I can't wait to come back."

The woman's body found Friday is likely that of 58-year-old Nogales, Sonora resident Ana Ofelia Rodriguez, Sanz said. He added that family members were heading to the Pima County morgue Monday to help make an official confirmation.

There was no official report of a missing male in the wake of the flooding, making identification of the first body found Friday a challenge. Sanz said the case had been turned over to the Mexican Consulate.

While there is no way to confirm identity or nationality, Sanz said that where the body was found strongly suggest that the

victim was also carried by floodwaters.

On Friday morning, the body was still lodged in a tree on the bank. Clothing had been stripped off of the corpse, which did not appear to show significant signs of decomposition. Due to the graphic nature of the scene, the NI has not published or posted online images of the body.

Media reports of two children missing after the floods raised fears of an even greater tragedy. However, as of Monday morning, Sanz said there was no official report of any missing minors, adding that the fact that no family members have come forward strongly suggests that no children were swept away by the monsoon rains.

An extensive search of washes and tunnels in Nogales, Sonora on Saturday turned up no additional bodies, Sanz said. Coss said his office has suspended search operations in Santa Cruz County because all officially missing people have been found.

Sanz said his office and other local authorities try to reach out to Nogales,

Sonora residents through traditional and social media as large storms approach to warn them to stay out of flood-prone areas.

"Even with that, we see that we still have fatalities," he said, adding that a "more effective" warning system and "more intense" public outreach during monsoon season might be necessary.

On May 5, 2015, UNS Electric, Inc. ("UNSE" or "Company") filed an application with the Arizona Corporation Commission ("Commission") for an increase in annual non-fuel revenues of \$22.6 million. Under its proposal, the Company expects the increase to be offset by a \$14.9 million reduction in fuel costs. In addition, UNSE is proposing: to include in its base rates \$4.3 million in transmission costs currently recovered through a Transmission Cost Adjuster; a one-year credit to the purchased power and fuel adjustment clause ("PPFAC") to reflect the deferred savings related to the acquisition of the Gila River Power Plant Unit 3; modifications to its rate design, its PPFAC, Lost Fixed Cost Recovery mechanism, and Net Metering Tariff for new net metered customers submitting applications for interconnection after June 1, 2015; updated depreciation rates; and modifications to its Tariffs and Rules and Regulations. Under the rates as proposed by the Company, an average residential customer using 983 kWh in summer and 669 kWh in winter would see a monthly increase of \$1.99, from \$87.83 to \$89.82 in the first year, and an additional increase of \$7.87, to \$97.69, in subsequent years. A customer's bill depends on monthly energy consumption. A customer using less or more than the average would experience a smaller or larger increase.





HAVASU WOMAN CHARGED WITH FOUR COUNTS OF CREDIT CARD THEFT

WOMAN ARRESTED AFTER DISTURBING HER FAMILY

announcement.

She said the plan is designed to encourage people to take better care of themselves and could lead to lower state costs, although savings estimates haven't been calculated. The state currently spends \$1.2 billion annually from the general fund on Medicaid, and the federal government provides an additional \$2.2 billion.

"You want people to get healthier to improve their life and also to be able to get them to a point where they can go back to work," Corieri said. "It's also important for the taxpayer. The same way it would be for any business, the healthier your people are, the less amount you have in costs."

The health saving accounts are designed to revert to the patient once they leave the Medicaid program to help them initially cover premiums and deductible and co-pay costs in the private insurance market. The idea is to encourage people to get better jobs with higher wages, even if they lose their free Medicaid insurance.

"You're really putting up this invisible wall right now by saying 'I'm going to go from paying zero dollars to saying 'my goodness I'm going to have 3 percent of my income in (premiums) and then I'm going to have co-pays and deductibles,'" Corieri said. "That is a huge disincentive to take that extra step to take that promotion at work."

The "strategic co-pays" in the plan will only be charged on services that are considered a poor use of the system, like unneeded emergency room visits, missed medical appointments or seeing

a specialist without a referral. The wellness incentives, common in many employer-provided health plans, could include smoking cessation programs, annual checkups or other markers set individually or by private Medicaid plan providers.

Other Republican-led states that have expanded their Medicaid programs have received \$2 billion for some of the things Arizona wants to implement. But they did so as part of agreements to expand Medicaid to people earning up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level that is part of the Affordable Care Act.

Arizona has already expanded its program without seeking additional waivers, so it is unclear whether all or some of the proposals would be approved. Most of the people targeted by the Ducey plan are in the expansion population or are childless adults or parents who aren't caregivers and earn less than 100 percent of the federal poverty limit.

A single person who earns just below the 138 percent Medicaid cutoff, about \$16,000 a year, would pay about \$25 a month into their health savings account.

"This is really the governor's vision of what he'd like to see Medicaid look like," Corieri said.

Ducey signed a law this year requiring the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System to apply for a waiver requiring able-bodied participants to work and limiting benefits for a lifetime maximum of five years.

Former Gov. Jan Brewer vetoed a bill with those requirements in 2014.

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The law provides for an open public hearing at which, under appropriate circumstances, interested parties may intervene. Any person or entity entitled by law to intervene and having a direct and substantial interest in the matter will be permitted to intervene. If you wish to intervene, you must file an original and 13 copies of a written motion to intervene with the Commission no later than **October 15, 2015**, and send a copy of the motion to UNSE or its counsel and to all parties of record. Your motion must contain the following:

1. Your name, address, and telephone number and the name, address and telephone number of any party upon whom service of documents is to be made, if not yourself.
2. A short statement of your interest in the proceeding (e.g., a customer of the Company, etc).
3. A statement certifying that you have mailed a copy of the motion to intervene to the Company or its counsel and to all parties of record in the case.

The granting of motions to intervene shall be governed by A.A.C. R14-3-105, except that all motions to intervene must be filed on or before October 15, 2015. If representation by counsel is required by Rule 31 of the Rules of the Arizona Supreme Court, intervention will be conditioned upon the intervenor obtaining counsel to represent the intervenor. For information about requesting intervention, visit the Commission's website at <http://www.azcc.gov/divisions/utilities/forms/intervenor.pdf>. The granting of intervention, among other things, entitles a party to present sworn evidence at the hearing and to cross-examine other witnesses. However, failure to intervene will not preclude any interested person or entity from appearing at the hearing and providing public comment on the application or from filing written comments in the record of the case.
