SELF-RELIANCE AND INDEPENDENT THOUGHT GEORGE B. GREEN RE-DISCOVERS

magine, if you will, a man who wishes to do right-for himself, for the planet, for the community. His name is George B. Green. George lives considerately. When asked to describe himself in three words, he says, "Respectful, mindful, responsible." George knows the sun is the giver of life and that any effort to impede its energy is morally suspect. George believes he will soon be self-reliant-this great American dream, articulated by Emerson, will soon be a reality. George is seeking "energy independence," "choice," and "freedom." He's heard Barry Goldwater Jr., Chairman of Tell Utilities Solar Won't Be Killed (TUSK), trumpet these virtues. Utilities and other profiteers wish to prevent George from living out the meaning of the American dream. How could they have the audacity to "tax sunshine?"

Renowned energy ratemaking expert Rachel Mad

dow says that charging solar customers for their use of the grid is "a fine for the crime of using solar." Tom Morrissey, former Arizona Republican Party chair, says, "If we can keep one dollar from going to people who are killing our kids in Afghanistan, it's a good thing-and I feel that's what solar energy does."



George believes something world-changing is upon us. Electric vehicles will let him sing a song of himself, free on the open road, hurtling through a new frontier. He will become a "prosumer," producing as well as consuming energy.

Evolving Customer

He already uses Uber and his phone is loaded with apps. He feels empowered and individuated, but also more interconnected than ever before. George values independence of mind and genuine self-reliance. Yet because electricity is the most political of commodities, George will have to cut through sloganeering to discern reality.

So, George begins to ask questions. Energy independence? From what? From Middle Eastern oil, perhaps? This isn't yet possible. From the utility? That's not possible, either. Freedom to do what? Perhaps to become energy independent and engage in choice? George feels these are circular arguments.

George learns that the National Academy of Engineering recognized the electric grid as the top engineering achievement of the 20th century, more momentous even than the automobile, the airplane, and the computer.

Thus it begins to dawn on George that even using Uber requires public infrastructure, that apps require a network that we all use, and that using distributed generation still means being connected to the grid from which he longs to be liberated. George begins to see that nearly everyone needs the grid to have reliable electric service. He starts to feel that perhaps we are all in this together-his environmental awareness taught him that. George doesn't quite understand how solar companies are competitors with utilities. They provide intermittent energy. Solar customers are still connected to the grid and need the utility to keep the lights on and to balance their energy needs. Mustn't one be a potential equal to be a competitor? In the final analysis, even though George admires and wishes to emulate Henry David Thoreau by living off the grid, he realzes that he values the contents of his freezer too much. Utility eliability, he recognizes, is the foundation for choice in his life, t provides a freedom and independence that he would miss, hould is disappear. He now understands that a healthy unity and electric system-with or without adar-enables him to chieve precises' the modecum of energy choice and indepen-

And so George begins to embrace a degree of energy independence and choice by employing smart devices. He installs utility-owned rooftop solar to make his life easier-



thereby living up to what Goldwater

called "true conservative principles" by not embracing a net energy metering subsidy George thinks is unfair. Goldwater had, after all, spoken of equality of opportunity for energy resources in a competitive marketplace. But this is exactly what foregoing a net metering subsidy means to George. George also recognizes that taking advantage of the subsidy means a "tax" on the 98 percent of Arizonans in APS territory who choose not to "go solar." George begins to develop an appreciation for irony: He knows the sun isn't free, that "killing solar" just makes it stronger, that solar is impractical without the utility connection that some pro-solar folks claim to despise. The utility can survive without rooftop solar, but rooftop solar cannot survive without the utility.

Ultimately, George learns that the utility grid is here to stay.

Indeed, the solar energy he wants would not power his home without a grid connection. In fact, the grid connection provides a continuous, reliable supply of energy. For George, Thoreau's Walden Pond would remain a dream. He recalls that even Thoreau had his mother fix him meals during his sojourn in the wilderness. George finally understands Edmund Burke's maxim: A disposition to preserve, and an ability to improve, is the standard for good public policy. Self-reliance, independence, and freedomusing all the tools at our disposal to manage our energy futuremay be achieved by both preserving and improving the electric system and strengthening the regulatory compact between utilities and regulators, while allowing solar to play its part. Our nation's utilities are uniquely equipped to preserve and improve our energy future by combining reliability with innovative customer-sited resources as few other entities can. George feels that Emerson would approve of his self-relianceespecially self-reliance manifesting itself as independence of thought, which is such a challenge in today's environment.

I'm reaching out as an employee of Sunrun, and as a member of the solar advocacy organization The Alliance for Solar Choice, both of which have been heavily involved in solar issues with Arizona Public Service.

As an analyst that covers Pinnacle West, I thought you might be interested in the attached perspective from Bank of America that downgrades Pinnacle West. In the wake of Arizona Public Service's attacks on rooftop solar, according to Bank of America, this downgrade "reflects our subjective assessment of the regulatory climate and relationships between Pinnacle West and key stakeholders." This emphasizes the reality that APS is destroying its relationships with regulators over the rooftop solar debate in Arizona. Additionally, I wanted to share a bit more info that indicates this is just the tip of the iceberg.

APS employees lobbied to implement property taxes on solar systems in Arizona (reported <u>here</u>). APS continues to deny these claims, contradicting a state Senator and the Governor's office. This no doubt contributes to the strained relationships APS has with other stakeholders, as mentioned in the Bank of America memo. It was also reported that APS CEO Don Brandt personally lobbied for the tax increases (<u>here</u>).

I'm happy to help answer any additional questions you might have on APS' attacks on rooftop solar in Arizona.

Dear Mr. Rive:

On April 28, I made a request of Solar City. I asked the company, via Mr. Rich, to provide this Commission with information regarding (a) how many Solar City installers are actually registered with the Arizona Registrar of Contractors, with unique licenses; and (b) what customer protections Solar City provides to its customers (specifically, in its lease agreements, paperwork filled out by the customer, and so on).

Three months later, I have received zero information from Solar City. Mr. Rich has always been responsive and responsible, so I have to assume the company has been preoccupied with filing lawsuits against the state, participating in rallies at the Capitol, and a myriad of other political activities.

Quite frankly, this lack of responsiveness would be unimaginable coming from a regulated utility.

Additionally, I would appreciate answers to the following questions:

(1) Does Solar City apply a yearly inflation rate to the utility price offset when projecting savings? If so, what rate is used? Also, what occurs if the projected savings do not materialize for the customer?

(2) What professional training, education, and industry accreditations do you require/encourage your employees to obtain? For instance, how many of your Arizona employees are NAPCEB-certified Installation Professionals? How many are NAPCEB-certified in PV Technical Sales?

(3) Are you preparing your customers to be good "grid-citizens"? Given the current discussions regarding smart inverters, future rate design, and the value of solar, will your customers be able to participate in next-generation tariffs when one takes into account the structure of your lease and the hardware being installed? This is particularly pertinent to those customers who have signed the disclosure and may be impacted by rate design changes. Put another way, will the systems you are installing now allow your customers to engage with -- and be fairly

compensated by -- a rate structure that takes into account more than just kilowatt-hour production?

Your dad, like JFK, always appreciated irony. Do you find it ironic that out-of-state solar company executives - fond of President Obama's energy agenda, with business before the Commission - are painting as liberal a conservative who, you claim, lacks integrity because he is the beneficiary of alleged "dark money" spending from a utility (Arizona Public Service) with business before the Commission?

In a larger sense, should Arizonans be concerned about out-of-state solar companies (many from California) spending hundreds of thousands of dollars to influence the election of regulators who determine what Arizonans pay for electricity?

Or are you comforted by the fact that the media have entirely ignored TUSK's spending thus far? Indeed, the solar industry has never spent so much on a Commission race, but it appears the liberal media we both bemoan have finally given a Republican organization a pass.

Given that private schools can exist (hypothetically) without public schools, yet solar cannot exist without the "dirty energy" (TUSK's words) provided by the utility monopoly, how is your analogy remotely plausible?

In other words, how can these latter-day Founding Fathers make the choice to "go solar" without the 24-7 power provided by the utility - the very entity which you claim impedes their choice? Doesn't the utility actually make their choice possible? Isn't solar's success dependent upon the utility's "dirty energy"?

Perhaps solar devotees such as Williams may someday resemble early American patriots in their fondness for candles and lamps, should their fantasies regarding the destruction of "socialist monopoly utilities" be realized.

TUSK opposes efforts to "tax sunshine," as you put it. (Rachel Maddow called it a "fine for the crime of using solar"). Caveat emptor, Barry?

Thank you for considering my questions. I know you and TUSK wish the best for Republican candidates and will publicly chastise them, with boatloads of cash, should they fail to embody the conservative principles we cherish.

Arizonans should reject the disingenuous, self-interested claims of those who care more about their short-term profits than the long-term viability of solar power in Arizona.

Indeed, this debate over serious ratemaking issues has been degraded by ill-informed rhetoric and misinformation about "energy choice" and "independence," as if adopting rooftop solar can enable one to live off the grid, in a manner resembling Henry David Thoreau at Walden Pond.

Forget Utility 2.0—the Power Sector Needs 'Regulation of the Future'

New technologies and financial innovation have launched an era of consumer choice and control in the power sector the likes of which the industry has never seen before.

Solar panels, smart meters, energy storage, electric vehicles and microgrids are transforming the distribution grid and spurring debates around a model for "utility 2.0." But while technology is stimulating change, policy drove the conversation at a meeting of electricity industry leaders last week, hosted by the Edison Foundation's Institute for Electric Innovation.
"Let's not have another discussion about grid of the future -utility 2.0, utility 3.0," said Lawrence Jones, vice president of utility innovations and infrastructure resilience at Alstom.

There's little value in designing a new technical model for the electrical grid, without a clear understanding of the system in which the technical model will operate, he said.

"We agree today we will no longer write another report [referencing the] 'utility of the future,'" said Jones. "What we need now is 'regulation of the future.'"

So what does "regulation 2.0" look like?

Today's regulatory framework is built on the notion of universal service and non-discriminatory rates that ensure everyone in the country has the ability to pay for electricity.

"I can't say, 'Is it fair to charge somebody more and somebody less for the same thing?' That's the system we have today," said Michael Champley, commissioner at the Hawaii Public Utilities Commission.

Having non-discriminatory rates "is a universal practice," he added. "But you can question whether it's appropriate for regulation 2.0."

Hawaii has been on the front lines of grid transformation, particularly when it comes to testing the <u>limits of rooftop solar</u> <u>penetration</u>. According to Champley, 12 percent of residential customers in Hawaii have rooftop solar -- the highest percentage of any state in the nation. As a result, Hawaiian Electric Company (HECO) reports that it's seeing an increasing number of distribution circuits with rooftop solar exceeding <u>100</u> <u>percent of daytime minimum load</u>.

In 2013, HECO initiated a strict approval process for solar systems connected to the grid. Consequently, the number of permits dropped by half, and the state's solar sector <u>shed</u> thousands of workers.

Regulators and utilities in Hawaii are now negotiating a comprehensive reform plan to guide the adoption of distributed energy going forward.

"We went forward -- way too far, probably -- without really having a master plan," said Champley.

Hawaii, and indeed many other states, need to find a sustainable model for customer choice, he said. For Champley, that means regulators should be less focused on fixed charges -- a view that some utilities would disagree with -- and more focused on establishing the right incentives.

"I believe we're going to have to have a whole lot of optional rate tariffs, as opposed to the one-size-fits-all [model]," he said. "I really do believe we're going to have to go to time-of-use or dynamic pricing."

"Ultimately, I think it's going to be...the more advanced developers that are going to figure out a value proposition for customers," he added. "And that value proposition needs to change from fleeing the grid financially, to how I can provide value to the grid and get paid for it."

"Plug-and-play, but at some point somebody also has to pay"

New technologies have emboldened consumers, to the point where some think it's their constitutional right to plug new technologies into the grid at their own will, said Champley. The term "plug-and-play" needs to further defined, he said.

"It's great you can plug in, but it's the rules and terms and conditions of how you play that makes the difference," he said.

"Plug-and-play, but at some point somebody also has to pay," joked Bob Rowe, president and CEO of Northwestern Corporation. Bob Stump, commissioner at the Arizona Corporation Commission, which oversees Arizona Public Service (APS), echoed that rate modernization is paramount to enabling consumer choice, while also ensuring that the new class of "<u>prosumers</u>" do not put additional stress on the grid.

Stump called the <u>controversial demand charges</u> recently approved by Salt River Project, which is not governed by the ACC, "an ingenious solution to peak shaving."

"I think the demand charge was an intriguing way to go about it, because it does offer that choice to the consumer, in the sense that you can reduce your usage during the peak, thereby the consumer can save and you can also help the grid," Stump told Greentech Media. "I hate the cliché 'win-win,' but I think there's a lot of potential there for good."

Increased utility control of rooftop solar would also help to reduce the impact solar arrays have on the grid, he said.

"I think we need to consider if you own solar or are involved with a leasing company, perhaps ceding some control of the inverters to the utility," said Stump. "Allow [the inverters] to be reprogrammed so the utility can speak not just to substation, but to the individual homeowner, and also reduce some of those voltage issues."

"The question then becomes in Arizona, and nationally, whether solar users are indeed willing to do that -- to be a good grid citizen, but [also] to have their panels potentially producing less," he continued.

Utility ownership of rooftop solar would go even further in helping the grid, because utilities would angle the panels west instead of south, accepting reduced efficiency to help with peak shaving, Stump said. It would also solve the issue of not taking infrastructure costs into account under net metering.

"Put the sloganeering aside"

The topic of utility control and ownership of rooftop solar has spurred <u>a lively debate</u>. Late last year, Arizona regulators gave the state's two largest utilities -- APS and Tucson Electric Power -- the green light to enter the residential solar market.

This comes as APS and leading national solar installer SolarCity continue a <u>heated battle</u> over <u>solar fees</u> and net metering policies. Stump called out Barry Goldwater Jr.'s solar advocacy group, Tell Utilities Solar Won't Be Killed (TUSK), for adding fuel to the fire.

To make his point, Stump told attendees at the IEI event a tongue-in-cheek story of the fictional consumer George B. Green, who is seeking energy independence, choice and freedom through rooftop solar. Along the way, however, George realizes that rooftop solar won't get the U.S. off of imported oil, and that the utility is central to both power reliability and a competitive energy marketplace.

Stump said he hears regularly from people who sincerely believe that deploying rooftop solar will enable energy independence and liberation from the grid. This is a point of view being encouraged in part by some of the louder voices in the solar industry, he said.

"I think if you take solar seriously, as I do, and I know everyone in the room does, then you will portray it accurately," he said. "As a regulator, all I ask [about] any energy source is to discuss the pros and cons."

<u>A 2013 study</u> by the consulting firm Crossborder Energy, determined that the APS net metering program would produce a net benefit of \$34 million each year by 2015.

Now, as the Commission considers reforming policies on rooftop solar, a new, comprehensive evaluation of the costs and benefits is essential, according to Stump. A range of stakeholders, including the Electric Power Research Institute, will be important players in this.

In the meantime, politicking needs to be put aside, he said.

"I made it very clear to my friends from SolarCity [that] we need to have a serious discussion about ratemaking. Put the sloganeering aside from all parties," said Stump. "These are serious ratemaking issues we need to get right and do it in a rational, mature way."

Testing new approaches

These discussions are already well underway in New York and California.

Flexibility needs to be at the heart of whatever new regulatory framework takes shape, said Robert Schimmenti, senior vice president of electric operations at Consolidated Edison, which is heavily involved in New York's <u>Reforming the Energy Vision</u> proceeding.

For Con Ed, demonstration projects -- like the distribution utility's plan to <u>defer rebuilding a \$1 billion substation</u> -- are proving to be pivotal in allowing the utility to test new business models and third-party partnerships.

"We also have the ability to fail. I think that's something that utilities aren't used to. We're tied to public safety and reliability, so we tend not to overreach and try to do things that might not be fruitful," said Schimmenti. "Demonstration projects will allow us to try thing some things and fail, and move on and modify some of those things."

Theodore Craver, chairman, president and CEO of Edison International, said he sees Southern California Edison playing a central role in enabling the grid of the future. "We believe we will be facilitators for all these distributed energy resources, and ones we can't even think of today," he said.

But similar to Champley and Stump, Craver said the utility industry's non-discriminatory regulatory model is creating barriers for the integration of new technologies. The flexibility for utilities to provide customers different levels of power quality through differentiated pricing is part of the way SCE envisions the grid of the future operating. "But we have a long way to go to get there," said Craver.

"I'm very optimistic we will eventually get 'regulatory model 2.0," said Alstom's Jones.

"We will get something, but it will be evolutionary," he continued. "I think we need to be very careful that disruption, albeit coming, will be at different levels, and that there are no unintended consequences. [...] We need to make sure to protect utilities, as well as others, so we don't blow up the whole system and end up flat-footed."

To: Fellow Commissioners and Interested Parties:

At our Staff Meeting on December 19, 2014, the Commission discussed and voted to open a generic docket to study business models related to solar distributed generation. Accordingly, the above referenced docket was opened on December 22, 2014. At the outset, I want to note that I believe that our inquiry should evaluate business models, practices and impacts for both residential and commercial distributed solar electric generation.

During recent REST implementation plan proceedings and in other dockets we have heard arguments and anecdotal evidence regarding the advantages and disadvantages of business models relating to both the leasing of and purchase of distributed solar electric generation equipment. There have been similar or related discussions in other states, before federal agencies, by Congress and in other venues. Distributed solar electric companies have collaborated with the National Renewable Energy Laboratory to study solar securitization and capital finance and formats for solar leases. Clearly these topics are of great interest to customers, stakeholders and utilities.

The leasing, purchasing and installation of distributed solar electric generation may fall within the purview of other Arizona state agencies, including the Arizona Attorney General's Office and the Arizona Registrar of Contractors. It is my hope that we will be able to collaborate with those agencies to identify any consumer issues associated with this equipment and in particular to ascertain the level of consumer complaints, if any relating to these products. Moreover, there may be other state, regional and national agencies and organizations which may have studied or evaluated such business models and their impacts. These entities could include consumer advocates, ratepayer advocates, technical organizations and government bodies. It may be beneficial to review their work in connection with our own inquiry.

I invite all interested parties to submit comments concerning the Commission's inquiry and to include information they may have related to entities which may have conducted or still are conducting, similar studies and analyses. Also, comments may include materials previously submitted in other dockets addressing similar issues. Submitted comments should be docketed in Docket No. E-00000J-14-0415. In addition, it would be most helpful in my review of these matters to have any submissions docketed on or before February 13, 2015. Further, I have not

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prejudged issues or reached any conclusions concerning this inquiry and I look forward to my future full consideration of these matters.

Code of Administrative Law Judge Ethics

ETHICAL STANDARD 1

AN ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SHALL AVOID IMPROPRIETY AND THE APPEARANCE OF IMPROPRIETY IN ALL ACTIVITIES

ETHICAL STANDARD 2

AN ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SHALL PERFORM THE DUTIES OF THE OFFICE IMPARTIALLY AND DILIGENTLY

ETHICAL STANDARD 3

AN ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SHALL REGULATE THE ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE'S EXTRA-JUDICIAL ACTIVITIES SO AS TO MINIMIZE THE RISK OF CONFLICT WITH THE ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE'S DUTIES

ETHICAL STANDARD 4

ETHICAL STANDARD 5

AN ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SHALL LIMIT COMPENSATION RECEIVED FOR QUASI-JUDICIAL AND EXTRA-JUDICIAL ACTIVITIES

ETHICAL STANDARD 6

COMPLIANCE

OVERVIEW

The Ethical Standards and comments contained in this Code supplant Ethical Standards 1.0 - 3.0 (promulgated on June 3, 1996) and Ethical Standard 4.0 (promulgated December 8, 2004). They are rules of reason and are to be applied consistent with constitutional requirements, statutes, administrative rules and decisional law in the context of all relevant circumstances. The Code is to be construed so as to not impinge on the essential independence of administrative law judges employed by the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH/Office) in making administrative judicial decisions.

This Code is not intended as an exhaustive guide for the conduct of OAH administrative law judges. They are also governed in their official judicial and personal conduct by Ethical Standards of general applicability to all state employees. The Code is intended, however, to state basic standards which govern the conduct of OAH administrative law judges and to provide guidance to assist such judges in establishing and maintaining high standards of judicial and personal conduct. This Code is based upon the NAALJ Model Code of Judicial Conduct for State Administrative Law Judges and Arizona Code of Judicial Conduct (1993; 2014).

While the Ethical Standards govern the conduct of OAH administrative law judges, every violation is not intended to result in disciplinary action. Whether disciplinary action is appropriate, and the degree of discipline to be imposed, is to be determined through a reasonable and reasoned application of the text and depend on such factors as the seriousness of the violation, whether there is a pattern of improper conduct, and the effect of the improper conduct on others or on the administrative judicial system. The Comments, by explanation and example, provide guidance with respect to the purpose and meaning of the Ethical Standard. Comments are not intended as a statement of additional rules. When the text uses "shall" or "shall not," it is intended to impose binding obligations the violation of which can result in disciplinary action taken pursuant to the State personnel system.

APPLICABILITY OF THE CODE

An administrative law judge employed full-time, part-time, or on an as needed contractual basis, who is empowered to preside over statutory or regulatory fact-finding or administrative judicial hearings involving public agencies or those contracted to have administrative hearings held before OAH, is an administrative law judge for purposes of this Code.

ETHICAL STANDARD 1

AN ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SHALL AVOID IMPROPRIETY AND THE APPEARANCE OF IMPROPRIETY IN ALL ACTIVITIES

A. An administrative law judge shall respect and comply with the law and shall act at all times in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the Office of Administrative Hearings.

Comments:

Public confidence in OAH is eroded by improper conduct and conduct that creates the appearance of impropriety. An administrative law judge must expect to be the subject of constant public scrutiny. An administrative law judge must accept restrictions on the administrative law judge's conduct that might be viewed as burdensome by the ordinary citizen, and do so freely and willingly.

Although purely social contacts or other non-legal dialogues are not prohibited, care must be taken to protect the administrative law judge's reputation for fairness, impartiality, and independence.

The prohibition against behaving with impropriety or the appearance of impropriety applies to both the professional and personal conduct of an administrative law judge. Because it is not practicable to list all prohibited acts, the proscription is necessarily cast in general terms that extend to conduct by judges that is harmful although not specifically mentioned in this Code. Actual improprieties under this standard include violations of law, Arizona Administrative Code A.A.C. R2-19-101 *et. seq.*, or other specific provisions of this Code. The test for appearance of impropriety is whether the conduct would create in reasonable minds a perception that the administrative law judge's ability to carry out administrative judicial responsibilities with integrity, impartiality and competence is impaired.

B. An administrative law judge shall not allow family, social, political or other relationships to influence administrative judicial conduct or judgment. An administrative law judge shall not lend the prestige of OAH to advance the private interests of the administrative law judge or others; nor shall the administrative law judge convey or permit others to convey the impression that they are in a special position to influence.

Comments:

Maintaining the prestige of OAH is essential to a system of government in which OAH functions independently. Respect for the Office facilitates the orderly conduct of legitimate administrative judicial functions. Administrative law judges shall distinguish between proper and improper use of the prestige of the Office in all of their activities. For example, it is improper for an administrative law judge to allude to the position of the Office to gain a personal advantage such as deferential treatment when stopped by a police officer for a traffic offense. Similarly, official letterhead must not be used for conducting the administrative law judge's personal business.

An administrative law judge must avoid lending the prestige of the Office for the advancement of the private interests of others. For example, an administrative law judge must not use the administrative law judge's position to gain advantage in a civil suit involving a member of the administrative law judge's family.

References or letters of recommendations are permitted if they are based on the administrative law judge's personal knowledge, although an administrative law judge is to be sensitive to possible abuse of the prestige of the Office.

An administrative law judge must not voluntarily testify as a character witness unless under subpoena.

C. An administrative law judge shall not hold membership in any organization that practices invidious discrimination.

Comments:

Membership of an administrative law judge in an organization that practices invidious discrimination gives rise to perceptions that the administrative law judge's impartiality is impaired. Whether an organization practices invidious discrimination is often a complex question to which judges are to be sensitive. The answer cannot be determined from a mere examination of an organization's current membership rolls but rather depends on how the organization selects members and other relevant factors, such as whether the organization is dedicated to the preservation of religious, ethnic or cultural values of legitimate common interest to its members, or whether it is in fact and effect an intimate, purely private organization whose membership limitations could not be constitutionally prohibited. Absent such factors, an organization is generally said to discriminate invidiously if it arbitrarily excludes from membership on such bases as race, religion, sex, gender, ethnicity, or national origin persons who would otherwise be admitted to membership.

Although Ethical Standard 1C relates only to membership in organizations that invidiously discriminate on the above-mentioned bases, an administrative law judge's membership in an organization that engages in any discriminatory membership practices prohibited by law also violates Ethical Standard 1 and Ethical Standard 1A and gives the appearance of impropriety. In addition, it would be a violation of Ethical Standard 1 and Ethical Standard 1A for an administrative law judge to arrange a meeting at a club that the administrative law judge knows practices such invidious discrimination, or for the administrative law judge to regularly use such a club. Moreover, public manifestation by an administrative law judge of knowing approval of invidious discrimination on any basis gives the appearance of impropriety under Ethical Standard 1 and diminishes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of OAH, in violation of Ethical Standard 1A.

ETHICAL STANDARD 2

AN ADMINISTRATIVE LAW JUDGE SHALL PERFORM THE DUTIES OF THE OFFICE IMPARTIALLY AND DILIGENTLY

A. Administrative judicial Duties in General. The administrative judicial duties of an administrative law judge take precedence over all the administrative law judge's other activities. Those duties include all the duties of OAH as prescribed by law. In the performance of these duties, the following standards apply.

B. Adjudicative Responsibilities.

(1) An administrative law judge shall hear and decide matters assigned to the administrative law judge except those in which disqualification is required.

(2) An administrative law judge shall be faithful to the law and maintain professional competence in it. An administrative law judge shall not be swayed by partisan interests, public clamor or fear of criticism.

(3) An administrative law judge shall maintain order and decorum in proceedings before the judge.

(4) An administrative law judge shall be patient, dignified, tolerant, attentive and courteous to litigants, witnesses, lawyers and others with whom the administrative law judge deals in an official capacity, and shall require similar conduct of lawyers, hearing participants, and representatives. An administrative law judge shall be courteous and respectful to the Director of OAH, the Assistant Presiding Administrative Law Judge, other OAH administrative law judges, and staff of the OAH.

Comments:

The duty to hear all proceedings fairly, with courtesy and patience is consistent with the duty to dispose promptly of the business of the administrative law judge and is essential to fostering the appearance impartiality. Apologizing to the recipients of such improper conduct does not excuse the administrative law judge of such conduct or negate the negative impact of such conduct. Once the administrative law judge has acted improperly, the damage has already been done and cannot be undone. An administrative law judge shall be efficient and businesslike while being patient, objective, and deliberate.

Taxpayers' Voice Fund spent \$62,521 on behalf of Commission Chairman Bob Stump and Commissioners Susan Bitter Smith and Bob Burns, each of whom won election against Democrats. The commissioners said they were not aware any of the money came from the utilities until *The Republic* brought it to their attention.

The commissioners denied the donations influenced any decisions or made them more likely to support utilities when it came to rates or other proposals. Stump said utilities should stay out of Corporation Commission races, calling it an issue of perception.

Judy Nadler, a senior fellow at Santa Clara University's Markkula Center for Applied Ethics, said that if utilities participate in regulator elections, it can "chip away at the public trust" that those officials are acting in the interest of public policy.

Although the amounts might be small, any participation can give political donors better access to politicians, tilting the political process in their favor, she said.

"The fact is (the utilities) were at the table when they shouldn't have been," she said.

Sandra Kennedy and Paul Newman, both incumbent Democrats, lost their 2012 commission races. Kennedy said Tuesday that it was difficult to believe the utilities did not know about the expenditure.

"I am really sorry to hear that those two entities got involved in our race," she said. "It's kind of hard to say after the fact and after you knocked off two incumbents that happened to be Democrats, 'That was a mistake.' " Anything the utility companies say I would have to take with a grain of salt."

Kennedy said she plans to run again in 2014.

New rules

The Arizona Business Coalition last week changed its rules for approving donations, so that its full board now must approve any money going to an independent expenditure committee.

After The Republic's inquiry into the non-profit, the group added four board members and the expanded board voted to codify its position against participating in Corporation Commission elections, Hamer said.

"We wanted to make it extremely clear this couldn't happen again," Hamer said. "I don't want to go through this exercise again."

Hamer said the Arizona Business Coalition was formed in 2010 after the U.S. Supreme Court's *Citizens United* decision, which allows corporations and associations to make unlimited political campaign contributions.

The non-profit was set up to support candidates through independent expenditures. APS has provided about \$101,000 to the Arizona Business Coalition since its formation, McDonald said. Southwest Gas has given about \$15,000, Washburn said.

An independent expenditure refers to a political advertisement that endorses or opposes a specific candidate. Under campaign laws, candidates cannot be involved with independent expenditures or direct how money is used. Unlike campaign contributions to candidates, there are no limits on the amount of contributions that an independent expenditure committee can accept.

Hamer said he made the \$7,500 donation after being approached by a representative of Taxpayers' Voice Fund, whom he refused to identify. He said he never communicated the donation to officials from either APS or Southwest Gas.

Washburn said Southwest Gas will continue to participate in the coalition because officials believe the group has enacted policies to avoid such a conflict in the future.

It remains unclear how much utility money was included in the \$7,500, which APS officials said "essentially amounts to token support."

Campaign-finance reports show that the \$7,500 represents one of the Arizona Business Coalition's single largest expenditures in 2012 political races.

In addition to the \$7,500, campaign-finance records show that the non-profit spent \$23,629 on independent expenditures for 10 state legislative races in 2012, mostly to support Republican candidates. Of those, its biggest contributions were \$6,342 to Rep. Russ Jones, R-Yuma, and \$3,718 to Rep. Paul Boyer, R-Phoenix.

According to NonProfitFacts.com, a Web-based service that analyzes tax-exempt organizations, the Arizona Business Coalition collected \$133,900 in revenue in 2012.

Uncertain origins

Campaign records provide almost no information about the origins of Taxpayers' Voice Fund. But the history of the independent expenditure committee helps explain the path that campaign donations can take.

Interviews and records show Taxpayers' Voice Fund was set up through a network of political consultants, one of whom engaged her daughter and her daughter's former boyfriend to be named as treasurer and chairman.

Treasurer Adriann Connell and Chairman Max Gregory are the only names listed on campaign-finance documents. In their early 20s, they are recent college students and shared a Scottsdale apartment until their breakup this year, according to records and interviews.

The apartment was the official address of the committee.

Connell graduated from Rio Salado Community College last year with an accounting degree. In an interview last month, she said she volunteered as treasurer to gain experience in political accounting. She said Gregory signed on as chairman because she asked him to do it.

Connell said her mother, Judith Connell, approached her about running the independent expenditure committee. Judith is a political consultant and owner of a public-relations firm called the Connell Group.

"I do a lot of (independent expenditure) work," Judith Connell said in an interview last month.

Connell said the two key backers of Taxpayers' Voice Fund were the National Association of Realtors and the Arizona Business Coalition, with the first checks coming just days after its creation.

"We got a check from the Business Coalition," Judith Connell said. "Then, we got a check from the Realtors."

Among the reasons the Realtors supported the three Corporation Commission candidates was that they favored free power-line extensions for development, according to Realtors association executives.

Connell said the purpose of the Taxpayers' Voice Fund was to back GOP candidates for the Corporation Commission. She said her only role was to get the independent expenditure committee up and running.

She said she set up the committee at the request of Gibson McKay, an Arizona political consultant. Connell said McKay handled the account and worked directly with the Realtors and the Business Coalition. She said any questions about the group should be directed to them. "I would call the Business Coalition, call the Realtors, call Gib (McKay)," she said.

McKay, who owns Sherpa Public Affairs in Phoenix, said, "The Realtors were my primary clients, and they liked certain candidates, and that was it."

The Taxpayers' Voice Fund received more than \$198,000 in contributions, campaign records show. The National Association of Realtors Fund gave \$122,500. The Realtors of Arizona gave \$58,370.

Exelon Generation, a Chicago energy company that wanted the Corporation Commission to allow electric retail competition in Arizona, gave \$10,000. The Arizona Business Coalition gave \$7,500.

Most of the money went for mailers on behalf of Stump, Burns and Bitter Smith, calling them "Arizona leaders with the right priorities. A team unrivaled." One mailer features pictures of the candidates and quotes from each. Although the mailer notes some funding sources, the Arizona Business Coalition and its ties to utilities were not mentioned.

Lobbying ties

Jessica Pacheco, who serves as APS' top lobbyist, represents APS on the Arizona Business Coalition and was on its board when it gave the \$7,500 to the Taxpayers' Voice Fund.

Corporation records in October showed Pacheco was one of four directors on the board, along with Hamer; Todd Sanders, president of the Greater Phoenix Chamber of Commerce; and Jose Esparza, a Southwest Gas executive. Corporation records were amended Monday to show the addition of four new board members.

Pacheco previously worked with Hamer at the Arizona Chamber of Commerce and Industry. APS declined to make her available for an interview.

APS officials said Pacheco said she had no idea that Hamer directed money to the Corporation Commission campaigns.

Southwest Gas officials said Esparza had quit the Arizona Business Coalition board and was replaced after the 2012 elections by Southwest Gas lobbyist Ann Seiden.

Seiden also formerly worked with Hamer at the Arizona Chamber of Commerce and Industry. But Southwest officials said nobody with the company was aware of the donation to commissioners.

"There definitely is an understanding here at Southwest Gas that is not something we do," Washburn said. "When we partnered with the Arizona Business Coalition, it was our understanding they had the same policy."

Reactions

Stump, the Corporation Commission chairman, said utilities should stay out of political races involving regulators. Although there was nothing illegal about donating the \$7,500 to the independent expenditure committee, he said, it created a perception problem.

"I agree with the policy not to get involved in (commission) races," Stump said. "I support a policy of no involvement."

Stump said he didn't learn the utilities were involved in paying for the flier until after it was published. He said based on disclaimers on the flier, he thought it was paid for by the Association of Realtors and Exelon.

Stump said the three Republican commissioners ran on a Clean Elections platform, which means they were prohibited from taking private campaign contributions in exchange for receiving funds from the state. Records show each received about \$220,000 in funds from the state.

Stump said he doesn't typically endorse Clean Elections campaigns but said in the case of the Corporation Commission the concept makes sense. That's because the commission works closely on issues that directly affect utilities; he said.

Burns last week filed a memo demanding to know how much money energy companies and rooftop-solar supporters are pumping into competing marketing campaigns. Burns said he is troubled by the campaigns, which he said could intimidate commissioners on their upcoming decision on solar subsidies.

Burns said he will make a second demand for the same financial information for campaigns on the issue of electric deregulation.

The commissioners this year were exploring the possibility of opening up electric utilities to retail competition, which would allow customers to choose their power provider. They canceled the hearings in September on a 4-1 vote after the commission's legal counsel raised concerns about its constitutionality.

Bitter Smith said she also was unaware that utilities contributed to their campaign. "I'm surprised, clearly,"
